## **Explanatory Notes**

- This achievement standard is derived from the Learning Languages learning area, Communication strand, Curriculum Level 8 of *The New Zealand Curriculum*, Learning Media, Ministry of Education, 2007, and is related to the material in the *Teaching and Learning Guide for Languages*, Ministry of Education, at <a href="http://seniorsecondary.tki.org.nz">http://seniorsecondary.tki.org.nz</a>.
- 2 Demonstrate understanding involves making meaning of NZSL by responding in their choice of NZSL, English and/or Te Reo Māori to the information and varied perspectives of the sign language that is viewed.

Demonstrate clear understanding involves selecting relevant information and varied perspectives from the texts and communicating them unambiguously.

Demonstrate thorough understanding involves expanding on relevant information and varied perspectives from the texts with supporting detail. Evidence shows understanding of the implied meanings or conclusions within the text.

- A variety of NZSL texts refers to different types of signed communications e.g. media extracts on topics of personal and/or community interest, conversations, short stories, reports. Some of the texts will reflect the relationship between language and Deaf culture and be adapted as appropriate.
- 4 Extended refers to developed texts on both concrete and abstract matters. This may include texts that develop a line of argument.
- 5 Evidence may include:
  - clarifying information, ideas and opinions.
  - summarising information, ideas and opinions.
  - producing, annotating, amending, and completing visual representations of ideas e.g. maps, sketches, diagrams.
  - retelling signed statements for a different or specific purpose e.g. making a recommendation or giving advice.
