When looking ahead to the next 25 years, medicine is set to bring huge changes to civilisation. The ideology of egalitarianism (equality and equal treatment across gender, religion, economic status, and political beliefs) can be seen in Dr Rachel Mackie's perspective about medicine for Māori in Aotearoa New Zealand, where she explains that equity is a major health concern for Māori, who are generally worse off because not enough is being done to meet their health needs. Mackie values indigenous rights, and, when looking to the future of medicine, has been raising concerns about the inequity she has seen for Māori in medicine, but feels this is not being addressed effectively yet. However, the new national health system, which is nationally planned, regionally delivered, and locally tailored, should help to allow communities to evolve their practices to address their communities' needs. Another ideology that has influenced the future of medicine in society is technological utopianism. This can be seen in many ways, including technologies that have been created to improve outcomes in the medical world for doctors and patients. Specifically, smart devices will provide insights into everyday life that once would have been discovered only through blood tests and monitoring. Smart devices can support people in avoiding and preventing suffering from conditions that would otherwise have needed monitoring, which creates an ideal living standard and demonstrates techno-utopianism.	The way that egalitarianism has / will shape the future of medicine is shown in the way that individuals / groups / businesses make decisions to embrace where medicine is heading. The medical community is progressively introducing and incorporating new technologies, such as smart watches, artificial intelligence, and virtual reality. Robert M. Wachter suggests that the new technology can be of benefit to patients because it democratises healthcare, giving access to new tools and information. Evolving community practices in Aotearoa New Zealand will mean that patients have access to new tools and information. Wachter believes that this will be transformative for patients and their communities.	Cell and gene therapy has the potential to prevent and / or cure diseases, including the growing number of rare diseases. The ideology that has the most influence on the future of medicine is egalitarianism because of all these new advances in technology. As Professor Yáñez-Muñoz says, "It's no longer just about hope, but now it's a reality – with a growing number of rare diseases that can be effectively treated with these therapies" These new treatments in healthcare promote equality because they provide access to medical care for all people with diseases. With this in mind, Aotearoa New Zealand began using a new health system in July 2022, designed, and established to enable a whole-of-country view of planning and delivering services, in order to be more efficient and consistent. This shows that when thinking about the future of medicine, egalitarianism has the greatest influence because the progress that has been made provides the best outcomes for patients, improving health, livelihoods, and life expectancy.
