Purpose

This qualification is designed for those who undertake or are involved with the planning of forest harvesting. The qualification recognises the knowledge and skills of those people already working in this area, or those wishing to gain entry into forest harvest planning.

The certificate recognises the skills of a harvest planner who is able to prepare an optimal forest operational plan that takes into consideration forest road and landing locations, available forest harvesting systems and other financial and non - financial constraints.

This qualification builds on skills developed through the National Certificates in Forestry at Level 4.

Special Notes

It is recommended that candidates for this qualification have prior credit for Unit 17772, *Demonstrate knowledge of environmental requirements in forest operations*, Unit 4294, *Demonstrate knowledge of procedures for costing forestry activities* or Unit 4293, *Determine forestry operations equipment requirements*.
