 - tau is evenly plaited with appropriate lengths to ensure secureness.

- 4 Demonstrate artistic skills to raranga tātua will be evidenced through:
 - tātua has no gaps and is of an exceptional quality;
 - muka is produced with skill to complete tau;
 - whiri tau is tight, plaited evenly and attached in a refined manner to enhance overall design of tātua.
- 5 Ākonga will keep a fully documented visual diary or workbook to assist with assessment and authenticity.
- 6 Definitions

Imagery may include but is not limited to – photographs, pictures, photocopies, videos.

Quality ensures rau is graded to complete tātua. Includes but is not limited to – broken, infected or discoloured rau.

Quantity ensures sufficient amounts of whenu are prepared to complete tātua.

Size ensures whenu are a consistent width and length.

Te Whare Pora – a house or place that is set aside to teach and conserve the art of weaving.

7 Referencing

All sources of information including *imagery* must be referenced. Referencing will prepare ākonga for the requirements of academic writing.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Select design and pattern for tātua.

Performance criteria

1.1 Pattern is selected to suit style and use.

Range size, colour, symbols, materials.

Outcome 2

Harvest and prepare materials to complete tātua.

Range may include but is not limited to – harakeke, pīngao, karamū, kāretu, kiekie, muka.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 Tools and materials for harvesting and preparation are identified.
- 2.2 Material is harvested in accordance with the tikanga of te whare pora.

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2.3 Material is selected and prepared.

Range may include – more than one material, using natural or dyed or

combination of natural and dyed;

quality, quantity, size.

2.4 Muka is extracted and prepared to complete tau.

Outcome 3

Raranga tātua to fit ākonga.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 Tātua is completed in accordance with style and use.
- 3.2 Tau is completed using appropriate muka whiri and attached securely to tātua.
