Elements and performance criteria

Element 1

Select mechanical fixings to fasten similar and dissimilar materials in the joinery industry.

Range may include but are not limited to – timber, metals, plastics, concrete, natural stone, glass, and composite materials; evidence of two is required.

Performance criteria

1.1 Mechanical fixings are identified and selected for the intended use in accordance with the job and manufacturer's specifications.

Element 2

Use mechanical fixings to fasten similar and dissimilar materials in the joinery industry.

Performance criteria

2.1 The mechanical fixing is selected, installed, and adjusted to conform to job, and manufacturer's specifications in accordance with workplace practice.

2.2 Health and safety precautions are taken in accordance with workplace practice and legislation.

Please note

Providers must be accredited by NZQA, or an inter-institutional body with delegated authority for quality assurance, before they can report credits from assessment against unit standards or deliver courses of study leading to that assessment.
