Guidance Information

- 1 English Language (EL) refers to the acquisition of English as an additional language.

- This unit standard may contribute to the New Zealand Certificate in English Language (Level 2) [Ref: 1881]. The requirements of this standard are consistent with the *NZCEL Guiding Document*. This document includes guidelines relating to appropriate texts, task specifications and assessment conditions and can be found at http://www.nzqa.govt.nz.
- 4 All assessment activities must be conducted in English, which must not be the candidate's first language.
- Assessment must be conducted in a supportive and familiar environment, in which affective barriers are reduced. Candidates may request assistance to understand the requirements of the assessment task.
- 6 It is recommended that:
 - i the outcomes are assessed as part of an integrated unit of work, relevant to the learning context of the candidate;
 - ii assessment be conducted in conjunction with assessment against other English Language unit standards at this level.

- The presentation must be the candidate's own work. The delivery cannot be heavily reliant on written notes. However, it may be delivered with only occasional reference to cue cards. The text must be primarily spoken but may include other appropriate presentation techniques, such as visuals. Visuals may include a minimal amount of written text, and should not be assessed as part of this standard.
- For the purposes of moderation, the assessment must be recorded audio-visually. Recorded work must not be edited. Guidelines for digital visual submissions can be found in *Preparing digital visual submissions for moderation*, accessed at: http://www.nzqa.govt.nz.
- 9 Definitions

Connected discourse refers to the use of simple conjunctions to link ideas. Errors refer to systematic use of incorrect language features. Familiar topics refer to topics that are well known and relevant to the candidate. Inconsistencies refer to variable control in language features, where the candidate can self-correct if necessary.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Present information on a familiar topic (EL).

Range two to three minutes in duration.

Performance criteria

- 1.1 Presentation is structured and relevant to the topic.
- 1.2 Presentation includes short sentences and some longer compound sentences with clear sequencing of evidence of connected discourse. It may contain hesitations, errors and inconsistencies, but is audible and can be understood.
- 1.3 Presentation conventions are used appropriate to the delivery of information.
