Grade 3 rapids Characteristics

- have fairly high waves of 1 to 2 metres,
- broken water, stoppers and strong eddies, exposed rocks and small falls,
- a passage that may be difficult to recognise from the river, and
- require manoeuvring to negotiate the rapids.

- 3 Definitions
 - Current industry good practice means the range of actions currently accepted within the adventure and outdoor sector (which includes the raft and riverboard industries) to manage the risk of harm to staff, participants, and visitors.

 Pod is the term used for one group of riverboarders.
- 4 Evidence towards performance criterion 2.6 can be collected under simulated conditions.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Demonstrate riverboard guiding techniques for Grade 3 river trips.

Performance criteria

1.1 Demonstrate manoeuvring a riverboard for Grade 3 rapids using river features to assist.

Range techniques to maintain upstream position, catching eddies, obstacle avoidance.

- 1.2 Scout rapids to identify hazards and select appropriate line choice.
- 1.3 Use riverboard lines through rapids based on assessment of participant's ability, group dynamics, the hazards and river conditions.

Outcome 2

Demonstrate riverboard guiding skills for Grade 3 river trips.

Performance criteria

2.1 Give safety instructions to participants that are relevant to the riverboard and trip.

Range

includes but is not limited to – river signals and commands; main flow; in and out of eddies using angles; hazards and how to manage them including foot entrapment, rocks (walls and/or boulder), each other; other users.

2.2 Use effective communication to train participants in riverboarding skills for Grade 3 rivers.

Range

riverboarding skills include but not are limited to – board holds, effective positioning on board, turns, turn in deep water, turn in shallow water, kicking, duck diving, barrel rolls, board recovery, entering and exiting eddies:

effective communication includes – clear instructions and demonstrations, checking for understanding, checking competence and providing feedback.

2.3 Apply guiding skills to provide participants with an experience that aligns with their needs, expectations and abilities.

Range

guiding skills may include but are not limited to – technical, dynamic risk management, interpersonal, communications, assessing participant needs and abilities throughout trip.

2.4 Communicate with participants and other guide(s) using appropriate river signals.

Range demonstration of situational awareness when giving river signals.

2.5 Demonstrate control of the pod throughout the river trip.

Range working with other guide(s).

- 2.6 Demonstrate control of pod in emergency situations for Grade 3 rapids.
- 2.7 Demonstrate river etiquette with other users and provide information to the participants.

Range

other users may include but are not limited to – anglers, landowners, kayakers, powered craft, swimmers, rafters, riverboarders.
