Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Investigate use of digital applications for leisure.

Range categories may include but are not limited to – recreation; education; information; communication; virtual reality, and simulations. evidence for three applications is required with each selected from a different category.

Performance criteria

1.1 The investigation contains an explanation of why each application falls into the selected category.

Range may include but is not limited to – target audience, presentation methods, content, purpose, strategy, outcome; a minimum of three are explained.

1.2 The investigation identifies the features of each application.

Range features may include but is not limited to – hardware and software requirements, user documentation, purpose, strategy, outcome; a minimum of three features of each application are identified.

1.3 The investigation includes a comparison of each application.

Range comparison may include but is not limited to – user friendliness, fitness for purpose, hardware requirements, outcome; a minimum of three aspects of each application are compared.

1.4 The digital applications are operated successfully in accordance with user documentation.
