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2 Social action is participation in society, in tangible ways, to either support or challenge a system.

A *system* is made up of various interconnected structures and components that are organised to achieve a specific purpose. Systems can exist in social, political, economic, or organisational contexts. Examples of systems include:

- an environmental system
- a media and information system
- a local health system
- a school system.
- 3 *Undertaken* refers to the participation of ākonga in a social action. This may include planning, organising, and carrying out the social action, either individually or as part of a group.
- 4 *Impacts* are the direct effects on individuals, groups, or places. These could be short or long term, positive or negative.
- 5 Suitability is the extent to which the planning, organising, and carrying out of the social action is appropriate, fitting, or well-matched in the aim of supporting or challenging a system.
