3. Describe the **opening scene** of the text(s).
Explain why the opening scene was important, supporting your points with visual and/or oral language features.
4. Describe at least one **important setting** in the text(s).
Explain how the setting helped you to understand at least one **idea**, supporting your points with visual and/or oral language features.
Note: "Setting" may refer to physical places as well as social and historical contexts.
5. Describe at least one **important object or symbol** in the text(s).
Explain why this object or symbol helped you to understand at least one **idea**, supporting your points with visual and/or oral language features.
Note: A symbol could be a place, person, or thing that represents something more than itself.
6. Describe the **structure** of the text(s).
Explain how the structure helped you to understand an **important idea**, supporting your points with visual and/or oral language features.
Note: "Structure" refers to the way a text is arranged.
7. Describe an **incident** that changes the course of events in the text(s).
Explain how this change helped you to understand an **important idea**, supporting your points with visual and/or oral language features.
8. Describe at least one **important technique** used in the text(s).
Explain how the use of the technique created impact, supporting your points with visual and/or oral language features.
