BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Wilderness is part of New Zealand's heritage. As a land, the New Zealand 'region' has been isolated from other continents for some 80 million years. During this long period, a natural landscape that is distinctively New Zealand in character has evolved. Since the coming of humans, the forest cover has been reduced from approximately 80 per cent of the land to only 23 per cent—and most of that remaining forest is confined to the west coast of the South Island and other mountainous areas.

A growing number of festivals and events such as adventure racing take place in these rural communities. These festivals and events are increasingly important for New Zealand's economic and social development. It is important that legislation and good practice protects the natural environment and rural peripheries from the negative impacts of festivals and events.

DEFINITIONS

Manaakitanga is an aspect of Māori custom and identity by which people are made to feel welcome
 and more.

Kaitiakitanga means guardianship and protection. It is a way of managing the environment, based on
 forest.

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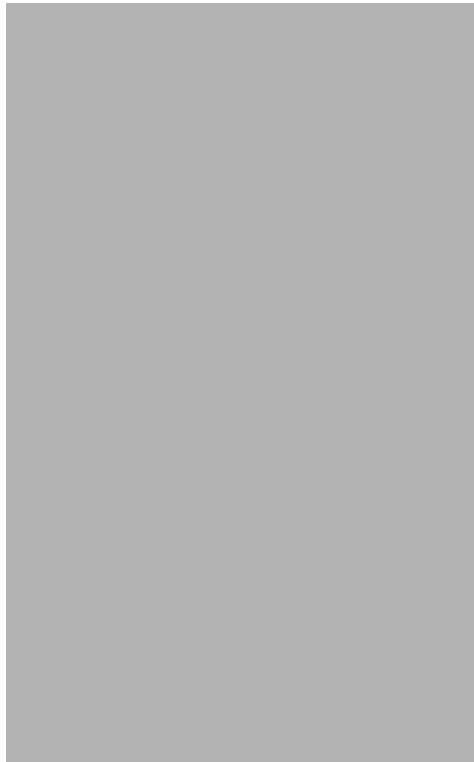
