Social dramas are serious, realistic, and dramatic films. They identify a problem in society and explore a cure in society through narrative, in which an individual confronts the problem. The conventions this genre uses are far framing of shots to show the protagonist is trapped within the mise en scene, close-ups of the protagonist in times of high emotions confronting the social issue, and motif of the struggle. Yes it's true as the audience becomes used to the genre social dramas, they demand more ~~as the~~ because they became emotionally engaged with the protagonist.

In the film the pursuit of happiness directed by Gabriele Muccino, released on december ~~15th~~ march 15th 2006, Helped convey the aspect that as the audience became used to the genre social dramas, they

demanding more because they became emotionally engaged with the protagonist. In the pursuit of happiness Gabriele uses the convention framing of shots to show the protagonist is trapped within the muse en scene. An example of this in the film The Pursuit of Happiness is the bath room scene with Chris and Christopher. This particular framing scene shows the audience the protagonist is vulnerable and trapped within the muse en scene. It shows the audience how difficult the protagonist's struggle and freedom and lack of choice he has. Chris and Christopher are trapped in the bathroom. This makes the audience emotionally engaged as they sympathize for them and maybe relate to them in anyway. Which makes them engaged and want to know more of the genre social drama's ~~through the film the pursuit of happiness~~ through the film the pursuit of happiness.

Secondarily in the film Erin Brockovich directed by Steven Soderbergh released on March 14th 2000, helped convey the aspect that as the audience became used to the genre social dramas, they demanded more because they became emotionally engaged with the protagonist. In the film Erin Brockovich, ~~the~~ Steven uses the convention close-ups of the protagonist in times of high emotions. Close-ups ~~are~~ ~~are~~ ~~an~~ within the protagonist ~~are used to evoke~~ ~~sympathy or~~ ~~empha~~ ~~empathy~~ within the audience. They ~~are~~ ~~an~~ intimate shot and ~~scene~~ with high emotions at times of extreme difficulty are used to evoke sympathy or empathy with the audience. They are an intimate shot and scene with high emotions can make us feel close to the protagonist and create tension. They are also used to slow down time to increase the emotion. An example of this in the film Erin Brockovich is when Erin is in a car driving and she gets a phone call from the person //

looking after her kids. He tells her that her daughter said her first word today. It's a long dark close-up of approximately 53 seconds long when she realises what she misses out on when she's at work trying to provide her family with income. Erin starts crying when she realises what she has missed out on. This makes the audience emotionally engaged with the protagonist because the close-up is a very long and intimate shot which helps us identify with the protagonist. It makes the audience want to see more as they are starting to understand the ~~social~~ genre social dramas and become emotionally engaged with the protagonist.

Lastly the film The Pursuit of Happiness directed by Gabriele Muccino released on December 2nd March 15th 2006, helped convey the aspect that as the audience became used to the genre social dramas, they demanded more because

they became emotionally engaged with the protagonist. ~~Gabriele uses the convention of~~
 In the film the pursuit of happiness Gabriele uses ~~not~~ the convention of motif of the protagonist's struggle. Motif (repeated patterns of imagery) are used to show the protagonist struggle or conflict they are going through. It's an easier way for the audience to relate to the protagonist. An example of this in the film The Pursuit of Happiness is when Chris is running awkwardly carrying a ~~bone~~ ^{density} ~~density~~ machine. This makes the ~~protag~~ audience engage with the protagonist as we can see the struggle Chris is feeling while he is running.

In conclusion through these conventions and films we see ~~how much social dramas~~ the impact social dramas have on the audience. They get the audience engaged. Social dramas are used to confront an important message to the viewers.

They are made to get the audience thinking about the issue and maybe trying to find a solution to fit the issue if it isn't already fixed.
