Question number: 4

To rise up from beyond where you came from is a universal desire and present in the film 'Slumdog Millionaire' directed by Danny Boyle. Throughout numerous settings he encapsulates the idea of the underdog triumphing repeatedly in settings like the Juban Slum, Orphanage and the Garmenton. We are encouraged to rise up like Jamal (the lead protagonist) and do what no one else believes possible.

One of the first settings in the film is the Juban Slum and it is where Jamal and Salim live. The movie opens with a chase scene with heavily percussive non-diegetic sound to echo the boy's feet as they run and try to escape the policemen chasing them. Through the use of a shaky cam of the boys jumping over a wall, we can imagine the shakiness of the slums they live in as unstable and tension is created as they run away. This is combined with numerous Dutch angles at the boys almost as if the camera had fallen over but kept recording as the boys ran past. The effect of these techniques is to create a hectic

Scene in which the boys come from and create a backstory for these boys that we can believe. These are only 8 year old boys and so a fully grown policeman should have no trouble capturing them, yet he is unable to do so. This triumph of the boys over the police officer is the first instance of the underdog triumphing in this film; an element it will continue to repeat. By placing this setting so early in the film the heart of the film is established early. Even the title "Slumdog Millionaire" is a ~~perfect~~ portmanteau of slum and underdog, who becomes a millionaire. We can understand how the underdog can triumph through this setting and overcome extraordinary odds.

Later in the film the boys are captured by Maman in the orphanage who deliberately disables children to receive more money begging. Through the birds eye view shot of the orphanage we can see how the new comers are separated from the disabled kids as to not let them realise what this is about. Later Maman (the orphanage owner) makes fun of Salim and so, shown through a mid shot, he climbs onto Puncoose and try tries to beat him up. Salim does not win, but his determination to win is visible. It is clear to the audience that Salim does not care about how bad his odds are, he will try and overcome them not however he can. When the boys realise what Maman is planning they escape aboard a train, with a closeup shot of Salim letting Latika

|| go so that they can escape. Once the boys understood what was going on they immediately escape and overcome the grown men chasing after them not by strength but by cunning. These boys were the underdogs and had even odds stacked against them, yet they were able to overcome them and triumph. What Maman was doing to the children was horrific and it raises ethical questions as to whether a family friendly movie should have such gruesome elements of torture. It creates a good villain that the protagonists can defeat but it brings disturbing images to light. ~~Regardless~~ By this is the second main occurrence of the underdog triumphing in the text and we can understand more about this idea. ||

|| One of the most important settings in the text is the gameshow studio. In this is where Jamal plays 'Who Wants to Be a Millionaire' and is the backbone for the structure of the movie. The host, Prem, says to Jamal when he sees him "Ah the chair-wallah!" which is making fun of Jamal as he only makes tea for everyone else at the office. Prem is established as the one in control of the situation and Jamal is, once again, the underdog in the scene. However, as Jamal goes onto to answer the questions correctly, the perspectives on him change. Whereas before Prem had numerous low angled shots to show his dominance, now the camera angles showed both men at equal ||

levels as if they were equals in the setting. This change is showing how Jamal is over-coming his background ~~to being~~ from being the underdog.
