The paintings La Gare Saint-Lazare by Claude Monet in 1877 oil on paint, and the La Absinthe oil on paint both convey symbols and meanings to depict and show importance of the modernity and everyday life of the Belle Epoch era and the new modern world of the industrial revolution.

This period is now filled with urbanisation and leaving the countryside for the fresh air, this is also modernity for the artist at the time because now they have new colours that are sold in tubes instead of them making their own colours. Photography is used in this period and it is an inspiration for the many artworks that are similar to a photograph and they are cropped. Artist now carry small canvas to take with them so they are able to paint En Plein Air.

La Gare Saint-Lazare shows the symbols of modernity through the architecture and the context of new technological things. The glass roof is shaped like church and it is in the centre top of the painting, and this new 'church' is where people gather and be in one place similar to churches back then and this is also the fact that the people gathered are of different classes. This is important as this conveys the celebration of modernity and how this train station is now a gathering place for many different people, this is a place where so many people go to everyday and the motif that this is the modern church for the people.

The Hausmannian apartments in the background is symbolism for the modernity and for the people of higher class can afford to live in as this apartment didn't welcome the lower class, kicking them out and that they aren't welcomed. It is important to know the context of social classes in this artwork that even if the train station shows that

it is a place where each and every different classes can gather in one place together like a church, in the background there is a building that doesn't welcome all. This is important as it conveys the everyday life of the lower class and that not all modern architectures are welcoming or not apart of socialism.

In comparison, La Absinthe painted by Degas shows a woman who is sitting a little farther on the right where she is sitting with a man beside her who is a pimp while she is prostitute that is working.

We can see that the woman is staring off into the distance, shoulder and back slumped. There is a table that separates us, the viewer from her. this is a symbolism of Degas' view of modernity in Paris is isolated and that it is affecting the working class people. With the table that acts as a barrier between us and the woman, it is a motif of the everyday life of a working class person that they are closed off and that they feel isolated and lonely.

Colour is a symbol in this artwork and instead of using the vibrant colours that other impressionism artist used, he uses very dulled down and muddy colours in this painting to depict his views of that isolation and struggle of the working class in the period of modernity. He mixes his colours to something much darker and this symbolises the darker reality of modernity that Degas wants to visualize for the viewer.

In conclusion, La Gare Saint-Lazare and La-Absinthe are paintings that both depict modernity but in different ways where Monet is more about the outdoors and celebratory of modernity where he paints the technological aspects that is very important to the modern world of industrial revolution, Degas is concerned about the social isolation in Paris where he instead paints a working class woman indoors. Degas' views of modernity is also reflected on himself as he is also person who seems to be isolated and that he isn't fond of painting en plein air and instead finishes his paintings at home where Monet embraces en plein air and is fond of painting the outside scenery which is a visual sensation with how he works with colours that are vibrant compared with less mixing in contrast to Degas who's painting the social classes of the working class woman as very muddy and dull to show his views in modernity.
