para 1: trauma + absurdity of war

- romantisizing war, her feminist perspective allows emotion to be brought in as a factor, reminders that real people are still suffering from wars effects, insensitive, desensitisation.

"Everything was beautiful and nothing hurt." A contradictory quote by main protagonist, Billy Pilgrim, presenting the harsh realities Slaughterhouse-Five represents with the yearn for peace co-existing together. Slaughterhouse-Five, a semi-autobiographical, antiwar novel written by Kurt Vonnegut during the Vietnam war. Exploring themes of time, fate and free-will, the absurdity of war, complexities of existence, war and death, irony and humour and horror, Slaughterhouse-Five follows the non-linear life of Billy Pilgrim before and after the infamous Dresden bombing. Slaughterhouse-Five became a instant classic because of the novels ability to make the audience question fate, free-will and the search for meaning amongst chaos as Vonnegut beautifully blurs the lines between fantasy and reality. During this essay I will discuss how the themes of this novel pushed me to see the world with fresh eyes, with firstly, the absurdity of war and how it has become glamorised, secondly, the theme of war and death, and finally, fate and free-will

War films have been a steady genre for over 60 years now, but have they gone too far? In the first chapter of *Slaughterhouse-Five*, is a recount of real life about author, Kurt Vonnegut, going to visit his old war friend Bernard O'Hare. During this visit he brings up his idea to write a book about his life and experience in World War ||. Bernard's wife, Mary O'Hare is a feminist and passionate person, as she overhears this conversation she explains her perspective on Vonnegut's original idea, "You'll pretend you were men instead of babies, you'll be played in the movies by Frank Sinatra or John Wayne or some other of those glamorising, war-loving, dirty old men" Another example of how absurd war is, is later on in the novel when Edgar Derby, a loving, middle aged, family man expresses, "one of the main effects of war, after all, is that people are discouraged from being characters" These quotes show how romanticised and dehumanised war has become. That making a film or a book and completely missing out the real and raw effects of war is deeply insensitive and morally wrong. Mary O'Hare's character allows us to take on a different perspective and focus more on how the ex-soldiers would feel knowing their story didn't seem to matter, only how successful and money earning the book and movie would be. She succeeds in her attempt to educate Vonnegut as he promises to name the novel 'the Children's Crusade' as a tribute towards Mary to not glorify war. Vonnegut's quote adds onto this theory by insinuating that individuality is lost during war and to continue that after is unfair. This theme has allowed me to look at my world and analyse further how different people would be affected by different actions, within people in my school, adults and different laws.

"I'm afraid of the things I may say when I'm not myself" Says Billy Pilgrim. This quote directly describes the feeling of not being able to control your mind after extremely traumatic events, (such as war). The theme of war and death in this book is one of the most prominant and obvious themes, this is also shown through Vonneguts narration throughout the book. One quote that sticks out is "Theres nothing intelligent to say about a massacre, everybody is supposed to be dead and never say anything or never want to say anything ever again. It's supposed to be quiet after a massacre, and it always is, except for the birds, and what do say say? All there is to say is things like 'poo-tee-weet?'" Vonnegut tends to insert himself into the novel by switching to first person from third person. This is to validate his claims, as if to say, I was there, that was me, this is real. The quote represents how incomprehensible events like this are, especially during war. It highlights the limits of language felt afterwards ("poo-tee-weet"), that speechless feeling you get because you cannot begin to understand the sheer violence you've just faced. This heartdropping emotion can be felt in todays society as women, we are getting our rights stripped away once again in many countries. The new laws in Afganistan, restricting women from speaking in public, looking at a man that is not either related or their partner, or the Roe v Wade abortion laws being overturned in America. These real world examples are evidence that the themes seen in the novel are still able to be mirrored into our world today.

Does everything happen for a reason? Can we control the events in our lives or is the universe and life itself predetermined? *Slaughterhouse-Five's* theme of fate and free-will is seen stronger throughout the later stages of the novel, with the alien, Tralfamadorian, characters making readers question the way of life. "Why you? Why us for that matter? Why anything? Because the moment simply is." said by the Tralfamadorians, capturing that uncertain feeling of what is capable of happening and what is in our hands. Vonnegut also displays this feeling as he says "All moments, past, present and future, have always existed and always will exist." This also exemplifies the theme of fate and free-will, letting us question if fate exists or whether each event was always going to occur. Fate and free-will is a intense topic to unpack, these quotes along with the theme have made me switch my mindset onto "what will be, will be." I believe this is a healthier mindset than to be overthinking each detail of life or a certain world event. However it also made me wonder whether or not we, as a human race can control anything. For example, climate change is a fast growing issue, is it really possible to change the world and come out the other end in a positive way, or has however the ending will play out already been determind?

Analysing Slaughterhouse-Five has enabled me to relate to the emotions presented during the novel laced inbetween the heavy themes and look at our world in a different light. Sharing that heartdropping feeling at times with the characters in the novel, thinking on my lifes events and what the future could hold. Overall, the themes of Slaughterhouse-Five were a rollercoaster, much like our worlds decisions today. Thinking back on the novels messages and themes in relation with todays world, all I could think to say was; poo-tee-weet.
