The Nature and Cause of the Monarchy Debate in Aotearoa New Zealand is an ongoing discussion recently resurfaced after the coronation of King Charles III, this debate renders the question of whether or not New Zealand should continue being a constitutional monarchy with our head of state being King Charles III. This debate has been resurfaced because New Zealand Society has become a lot more independent and New Zealanders aren't sure if being in a monarchy with Britain still aligns with the values and identity of New Zealand today, this brings our society to question whether or not New Zealand should become a republic and if New Zealand is ready for that yet. - (b) Describe TWO of the individuals/groups involved in the conflict and their points of view, values, and perspectives.

The two individuals and groups i have chosen for my PVP's are Te Pāti Māori and former Prime Minister Sir John Key. Starting off with Te Pāti Māori ~~are~~ co-leaders Rawiri Waititi and ~~Debbie~~ Debbie Ngawera-Packer, Te Pāti Māori is an activist group, ~~believing that~~ they recently launched a petition calling on ~~the~~ the Parliament to Remove the british royal family as head of state and create a Te-Tiri Te-Tiriti -centric Aotearoa through constitutional transformation. Te Pāti Māori spread their petition through their website, media releases, and their social media, an example is their instagram account, which as of march 2024 carently has 124,000 followers. their petition web page states "the only way this nation can work is when Maori assert our rights to self-management, self-determenation and self-governance over all our domains. its time to remove the british royal & family as head of state and move towards an Aotearoa that is a Te Tiriti o Waitangi - based nation. its time to dismantle this system so we can rebuild one that works for everybody" Te Pāti Māori has an activist point of view, and strong beleifs that we are ready to move foward, they also have a strong cutural values this is clear in their beliefs on the state being Te Tiriti o Waitangi based nation

- (c) Explain how BOTH social forces in Resources C and D have contributed to the conflict.

The monarchy is a group that believes ~~new Zealand~~ being in a monarch with Britain is is a vital ~~part of our~~ component of our government, a guarantee of our democracy and a sign of New Zealand's independence and maturity as a nation, this group aims to advocate ~~and~~ for the British monarchy and educate New Zealanders on the history of the monarchy, a history they describe as long, rich and colourful. The reasons they support the monarchy are, monarchies are stable and far more successful at protecting democracies, in a world full of divisions and selfishness New Zealand shares its head of state with 14 other countries. and our monarchy is the least expensive available to the New Zealand taxpayers and provides the best possible value. Winston Peters, our current Deputy Prime Minister is confused that New Zealand would ever want to change, one reason being that over the past 69 years we've had 2 sovereigns, Queen Elizabeth and King Charles, but 15 governors-general and 18 prime ministers, many prefer the monarchy over temporarily powered politicians any day. "We know ~~it~~ we're onto a good thing with ~~the~~ our monarchy, we're part of something bigger than us and it works."

- (a) If New Zealand were to become a republic when would they be ready? , the majority of New Zealanders who answered the poll said ~~the~~ New Zealand would be ready in 10 years, as well 44% of respondents stated the monarchy is "part of a colonial past that has no place in New Zealand today". Older people were more likely to vote in favour of the monarchy, with Nearly a third of over 65's said they would vote in favour of it, almost ~~2~~ two-thirds of under 24's, however said they would vote for becoming a republic. the full breakdown of the poll revealed 34% of New Zealanders would vote the country to become a republic and 44 percent would vote ~~for~~ to keep the monarchy. some of the reasons people wanted to vote for the change to republic include, the monarchy being a representative of our past, New Zealand Should be led by someone who is actually living here and the royal family doesn't represent our diverse nation. the ~~reasons~~ reasons for keeping new zealand as a monarchy include there are more pressing political ~~views~~ priorities, it unites new zealand with the 14 other countries we share our head of state with and the monarch is politically neutral, representing everyone regardless of political views.
- (b) Sir John Key, our former Prime Minister has stated that he does not believe in New

would or should ~~ever~~ become a republic any time soon due to the problematic side affects of selecting a head of state, that these side affects would be even greater if it was decided that a president should be elected rather than appointed. This is a reasonable point as we can already see the way elections and presidents cause a divide in society. John Key also mentions how being in a monarch ~~is~~ is great for new zealand and having royal visits with ~~reporting~~ reporters sharing stories about new zea is great for us. "the focus of more than 120 international reporters and photographers means pictures and stories of new zealand are being beamed around the world as the royal tour is being reported overseas. as ~~a~~ Tourism Minister i know how valuable that is." John Key is a Monarchist because he truly believes that its the best thing for new zealand and becoming a republic would be a bad decision for new zealand.
