(a) if New Zealand were to become a republic when would they be ready? , the majority of New Zealanders & who answered the poll said the New Zealand would be ready in 10 years, as well 441 of respondents stated the monarchy is " part of a colonial past that has no place in New Zedland today". Older people were more likely to vote in favour of the monarchy, with Nearly a third of over 65's said they would vote in favour of it, almost 2 two - thrids of under 24's, however said they would note for becoming a republic, the full breakdown of the poll revealed 341- of New Zealanders would vote the country to become a republic and 44 percent would note to keep the monarchy.
