## QUESTION ONE

Do you think Chloe and her parents enjoyed their trip to China? Use evidence from the passage to justify your answer.

Chloe and her parents just came back from China yesterday morning, so she is quite tired. She went to Beijing and Shanghai, and even though China's winter season is a lot colder than NZ winter, she and her parents felt that the trip made them very happy, and fun, and it is a memorable trip that they had together. Chloe has many positive comments about their trip, that we can conclude that they enjoyed their trip. Firstly she said that the trip was a very memorable trip, this means that overall, she finds many aspects of the trip enjoyable. For example, she finds it very convenient that shops and restaurants in China, close so late at night. She and her parents gained an interesting culture and insight that is very different from NZ, because the night atmosphere is very lively and crowded as there are a lot of people, yet she finds it safe and warm. In Shanghai especially it's known as the "city that doesn't sleep" which they find interesting and enjoyable due to the exposure of a different lifestyle that is not seen in NZ, hence supporting how much they enjoyed the trip. ## QUESTION TWO

Do you think it was a good decision for Xiaopeng to immigrate to New Zealand with his family? Use evidence from the passage to justify your answer.

From Xiaopeng's descriptions and explanations, we can see the joy he has from living in NZ for 5 years now, and moving away from China. He talks about the cultural differences and lifestyles that confirm that Xiaopeng's decision to move with his family to NZ was a good decision. Firstly, he and his family (wife and daughter) came to NZ on holiday for a month and was instantly amazed and influenced by the beautiful nature and scenery, and the friendly people, but most importantly from travelling, they began to understand a different life perspective. In China, he finds work very tiring, and even though he earns a lot of money, yet he knows that it is not healthy. Even his daughter who is in primary has a lot of homework and exams, and he notices that he can't see her happiness and smiling. This culture in China is different to NZ, and so when he sees children in NZ so happy and healthy, he starts to consider living in NZ for the purpose of his daughter and to have a more balanced and healthy lifestyle, because we learn that he prioritises his health and lifestyle more than a job. Therefore this is a good decision because in NZ he can be healthier and live life healthier. Xiaopeng's challenges to get to NZ include the initial disapproval from his parents because they were already 80 years, so they did not accept quickly, but they made a compromise where they would visit China every year, and this year the grandparents would come to NZ to visit. Therefore because they made a mutual agreement, I think it's not creating difficulties for them to connect and see each other. And another challenge was finding a job, even though both the wife and husband had job experience it was difficult for them to find a job so they studied for a year, then after a year they got a job. And in this job, even though not paid as much can have time to rest, spend with family, and overall be healthier. This further supports being a good choice because the family can have a better quality of life and can have a balance between life and school for daughter, and work for parents. And his daughter also enjoys life in NZ more because she enjoys the school. Therefore, from aspects of having a healthy lifestyle, a better quality of life from having balanced life and still being able to see the grandparents, the choice was good because they are happier and we can hear how excited and happy he is to talk about how well he is doing, and his family in NZ.

### QUESTION THREE

Do you think Xiaomei could be convinced to travel alone? Use evidence from the passage to justify your answer.

I believe that Xiaomei can be convinced to travel alone. From her conversation with her uncle, I can notice that she trusts and respects her uncle's opinions and views, and so I think she has been influenced by her uncle. Firstly, Xiaomei wants to find out about what she can do next year because she does not want to attend university. When her uncle suggests travelling alone, she is initially taken aback because she thinks that you can experience a different country's by seeing online programs. However her uncle reminds her that those people have different stories, and that she will have her own story of experiences. And her uncle says that travelling is like an escape from reality, where you can experience and immerse in culture, meet friends, eat food and learn about how other people live their life. At this point, I believe that Xiaomei becomes a little interested from the insightful wisdom from her uncle, and admits that she feels scared because there will be no parents or friends to help her. At this stage her mindset has already shifted because she does not go against travelling, but she is just worried about difficulties she might face. This shows her open-minded thinking and growth mindset as she begins to consider travelling as an option next year. Her uncle reminds her that because she would travel alone, she would have to solve it on her own, and she will gain problem solving skills, and opportunities to learn new things, ultimately, she would build more confidence in herself. Xiaomei responds positively and says that she wants to be more confident, which further shows how she is getting convinced and interested to go travelling. And when her uncle says that the advantage is you can just go wherever you want, and he likes going to places that other people don't know, she asks him to help her, do you think I can go? And she says she wants to work first in part-time job to get some money, then travel alone. Therefore I think now, she has been convinced because firstly she sees and trusts her uncle's opinion, she values his wisdom and input because of his experience. Secondly she is open-minded and wants to gain confidence in herself, and she is willing to improve herself. And lastly she begins to see the advantages of travelling, and she wants to go herself to experience the goodness of travelling alone. Therefore I think she is convinced and even though slightly worried initially, but after learning more, she will be fully convinced.

It is supported by detailed evidence from the text, demonstrating an understanding of nuanced meanings, such as the cultural comparison between China and New Zealand and how full immersion contributed to improving Chloe's language skills.
Two	E7	The response demonstrates a clear understanding of Xiaopeng's decision to move to New Zealand, highlighting the cultural contrast in work-life balance and family well-being. It emphasises his prioritisation of family happiness and health over material success, supported by examples of their improved life and connection with grandparents. This nuanced understanding, with accurate evidence and clear explanations, justifies the conclusion that the move was a positive decision.
Three	E7	The response demonstrates a thorough understanding of whether Xiaomei could be convinced to travel alone, analysing both explicit and implied meanings. It explores her nuanced perspective, considering her initial reluctance and the impact of her uncle's arguments. This analysis effectively addresses the question, demonstrating a deep understanding of Xiaomei's evolving mindset.
