Vehicle access to Waimārama Beach has been a challenging issue for many years. In the summer of 2023 / 24, it reached boiling point when a spokesperson for the Ngāti Kahungunu iwi blocked an access point to the beach with limestone boulders. As Waimārama falls under the umbrella of the Hastings District Council, it is the council's responsibility to make a decision to solve this challenge.

(a) Explain the challenge that beach access is causing at Waimārama Beach. Include supporting evidence from the resources in your discussion.

waimarama beach is facing a challenge with vehicle access. Vehicles are normally allowed to drive on the beach except for in front of the waimarama domain reserve between 8am - 8pm and from labor weekend until April 1st this is because this is the main times when beach goers are at the beach and there busy time of year where they get there tourist spending from. They also have a speed limit of 20km/h the challenge the town and Hastings district council is facing is that they cannot monitor if these rules are being followed this leads to the damage of the fragile sand dune ecosystem that includes the beach and the sand dunes which provides a natural barrier between the water and the residents of waimarama this help against see level rise and also any natural events that may occur these vehicles are also causing disturbance to feeding and nesting areas of the terns and dotterels that try to live and nest at waimarama vehicles are also a huge risk to human safety as we see when resident Sophie Stevens a waimarama tells a story of vehicles speeding and doing donuts up and down the beach and the dunes. Three possible options the Hastings District Council could take to meet the challenge of vehicle access to Waimārama Beach include:

- Option 1 no change to the current restrictions vehicles are allowed on part of the beach
- Option 2 put a permanent and complete vehicle ban on the entire beach
- Option 3 remove all vehicle bans from Waimārama Beach.

They think a full vehicle ban is not good because they use there vehicles on the beach for the purpose of transporting fishing gear they also talk about how they buy stuff at the local waimarama store before or after they go fishing which bumps up the economy and if beach access is closed they will just go somewhere else Ngāti Kahungunu spokesperson: T ヨッヨッ ち ぐ ② R ngati kahungunu iwi has a cultural viewpoint because they own the land to the left and right of the settlement is Maori owned land and has a huge cultural significance to them and they are sick and tired of there dunes being ripped and there kids being run off the beach by vehicles they want a full vehicle ban on the beach and they took there own action to solve the problem and placed large limestone rocks at the beach end of tiakitai road blocking vehicle access the the northern part of the beach this ties viewpoint ties into kiakitanga (guardian ship of the land) because they want to save there dunes and beaches. i think waimarama and the hasting district council should place a full vehicle ban on the beach. I think they should do this because of the viewpoints of the community mostly telling us that vheicels on the beach has been a bad thing and has been endangering the natural wildlife that live and feed on the beach and also the beach goers that are having bad encounters with vehicles on the beach these vehicles are ruing the ecosystem and destroying dunes that provide a natural barrier from climate change and rising sea leaves i think this option is better than the other proposed ones because if they fully removed all vehicle bans from the beach it would add the problem which could cause people being badly injured or death because of the cars and if they keep the restrictions the same nothing would ever change and no one would be happy this ties into kiakitanga which is guardianship of the land

(ii) Explain which viewpoint or perspective was most important when making your decision in part (i).

a social viewpoint was most important because making people safe is the number one priority and local residents complaining about scary and frighting encounters with vehicles on waimarama beach because of the beach being used as a racetrack and speeding, donuts, and erratic driving hapning on the beach this could end up causing injury or death on the beach this ties into the Maori concept of manakitanga which is to protect and care for people.

In (b), the answer focuses on people's preferences rather than explaining their perspectives or viewpoints on the different potential solutions to the challenge. There is also some confusion between viewpoint and perspective. In (c)(i) the candidate does not fully explain their choice or consider alternative options. The response to (c)(ii) does not demonstrate an understanding of the holistic nature of decision-making.
