Example of an Excellence answer: Yes, I agree with the points the writer makes. I am also a dog lover and have grown up with a dog who is my best friend. He always jumps up with excitement when I get home and wags his tail enthusiastically. He is never in a bad mood like some of my human friends can be sometimes. Every day, rain or sunshine, we take him out for walks, which forces us to do some exercise. This is healthy for us, even though we don't appreciate it so much on a rainy day. I love my dog for being my best four-legged friend, like he is for the speaker. I also agree with the speaker that dogs should be allowed to come into shops that don't sell food items. I love seeing dogs lying under a table when people are in restaurants. In New Zealand, we really only see this in cafés where there are outside tables. I think dogs should be allowed to go into all restaurants and cafés, as they are part of many families and should be able to accompany their owners as long as they have been socialised well. 		

Possible evidence is not limited to these examples. Answers are judged holistically, not solely on the basis of evidence included in the schedule.

Assessment judgements are based on the level of understanding shown rather than knowledge of individual lexical items.

<p><i>(b) Possible evidence showing understanding of which transport options the candidate prefers, and why.</i></p>	<p>Example of an Excellence answer:</p> <p>I would prefer to live in a big city in Germany like Jürgen because of the excellent public transport possibilities. It is easy to go to town or to the movies quickly, as he says. Another reason why I would prefer living in a big city is for the environment, rather than in a town where cars pollute the atmosphere very badly and people waste their time sitting in traffic jams, and then, when they do finally arrive at their destination, there is nowhere to park. I would definitely prefer the public transport convenience of living in a big city like Jürgen.</p> <p>OR</p> <p>I would much prefer Danielle’s situation of living in a smaller town in New Zealand. How exciting to be able to get your driver’s licence at an early age like Danielle, and have access to a car (even if it is not your own) to drive yourself places. In Germany, you have to wait so much longer to be able to sit your driver’s licence. If I had a job like Danielle, maybe I could even save up enough money to buy my own car. I like Danielle’s independence and I can understand why her parents don’t want to be her taxi drivers.</p> <p>I think having your driver’s licence would give you a lot more freedom to go anywhere you want, provided your parents give you access to the car. I realise cars are bad for the environment, but Danielle doesn’t seem to have any other choice, where she lives. Maybe one day, her parents or she herself will own an electric car which will give her the best of both worlds. I definitely prefer Danielle’s transport options.</p>

Luckily her nice friends rescued her, and paid for her movie ticket and some food, so she could still enjoy the evening. Maybe she will be more careful with her bag in future, after this not-too-good experience.</p> <p>Stefan lost his cellphone and accidentally left it lying on the seat beside him in the bus because he was very tired. He has been able to replace it since it happened to him about three months ago, but he still feels nervous about losing it again whenever he can't find his phone. He now has an extra incentive not to lose it. He now has a great new girlfriend and he doesn't want her to break up with him.</p> <p>Carmen seems to be the one who is still affected by her loss the most out of the three people described. She is still sad that she lost her favourite earrings, which were a gift from her mother, and the worst thing is that she is sure she made her mother sad, too.</p>
