Sample response

The performers will participate in a noho marae where they will learn an action song, a haka, a poi and a mōteatea. According to the text, they will spend the most time on the mōteatea. Also, at a certain point, males and females will separate so they can work on the parts of the performance that are relevant to them – the haka and the poi. Personally, I think the noho marae is a start to preparing them well for the competition. However, one noho marae will not be enough. I would suggest that they have various noho marae and focus on fewer items in each noho marae. One hour to learn a haka, for example, is not enough.

Sample response

Hine specifically mentions a previous competition that she attended in 2008, which had an excellent level of Kapa Haka and reo Māori, but unfortunately was freezing cold and they were long days! In comparison, at this current competition she doesn't really discuss the weather. It seems as though the main possible downsides are the weather and the long days. However, if you love Kapa Haka, you'll probably think the long days full of performances are awesome. Some other benefits she mentioned about attending the competition were being able to buy clothes, food, and taonga (precious adornments). The important themes explored in "Ka mau te wehi's" performance show the depth of the performances.
