He wants to experience something new connected to his family and the Tongan language. Kaivai has been inspired by a movie he saw about Tongan's mother tongue. This has directly connected to his life experience, and he realises "a part of [himself] is missing". 	Describes some details. Demonstrates basic understanding. (a)	 What were Mālohi's thoughts about the New Zealand singing competition? Mālohi did not expect to win the singing competition in New Zealand. He was so surprised when his name was called out. Mālohi "nearly fell over in shock" when his name was called as the winner of the singing competition, so he definitely did not expect to win. Mālohi had already applied for university to study something completely different, speech therapy, so he wasn't expecting to succeed in this singing competition. Mālohi wants to keep improving his singing, "I just want to keep focusing on singing well," because this will enable him to realise his dream of singing all over the world on big and famous stages in well-known cities such as London, Vienna and Buenos Aires.
