(c) Possible evidence showing understanding of whether Juana had positive or negative experiences in the shops she visited.

Fruit shop:

Juana had a positive experience: she got what she wanted and she paid a good price for it. The shop assistant was friendly and empathetic when Juana said she was tired. The assistant gave Juana two options for bananas she could buy and demonstrated goodwill by recommending the freshest ones. When Juana said the price was too high, the assistant offered a 20% discount.

Clothing shop:

Juana had a negative experience as she didn't find what she wanted at the shop. The shop assistant told her they didn't have any dresses because they sold the last one vesterday, which disappointed Juana. The assistant offered beautiful clothes, including a nice pink skirt, but Juana doesn't like bright colours and had asked for long black skirts, of which the shop had none. When she asked about trying on a shirt, the assistant informed her that they didn't have her size (10) in stock, only sizes 12 and 14. This meant Juana had to go to another store. The assistant wasn't as friendly as the assistant in the fruit shop, and they didn't ask her how she was or wish her well.

Identifies whether Juana had positive or negative experiences in the shops she visited. Uses examples from the passage.

For example:

- Juana had a positive experience at the fruit shop because she got what she wanted and paid a good price for it.
- Juana had a negative experience at the clothing shop because she wanted a dress to wear to the party but the shop didn't have any dresses.

Explains whether Juana had positive or negative experiences in the shops she visited. Uses examples from the passage, makes links.

For example:

- Juana had a positive experience at the fruit shop because she got what she wanted and paid a good price for it. The shop assistant was also friendly, asking how she was and wishing her well at the birthday party, as well as recommending the best bananas to buy and giving her a 2,000 peso discount. She bought a kilogram of bananas.
- Juana had a negative experience at the clothing shop as the shop assistant was not as friendly as the one at the fruit shop. They didn't ask how she was or wish her well. The shop also didn't have what she wanted (a dress to wear to the party).

Presents a thorough explanation as to whether Juana had positive or negative experiences in the shops she visited. Draws conclusions and justifications.

For example:

- Juana had a positive experience at the fruit shop as she was able to find exactly what she was after. The shop assistant was empathetic to the fact that she was tired (Juana had stayed up late) and gave her two options for buying bananas, demonstrating goodwill by recommending the best and freshest ones. When Juana said the bananas were too expensive, the attendant offered a discount of 2000 pesos. The attendant wished her a good time at her cousin's birthday party when she left the shop, demonstrating that they were friendly and had been listening to her.
- Juana had a negative
 experience at the clothes shop
 as she couldn't find what she
 was looking for. The shop
 assistant told her they sold the
 last dress yesterday, but
 showed her some beautiful
 shirts and skirts. They were not
 to Juana's taste.Juana asked
 about trying on a shirt but they
 didn't have her size, so she
 had to go to another store. The
 shop assistant wasn't friendly.

Although there were many good things about Tomatina that made the festival an exciting experience, she thought that there were too many people and it was very crowded. This may have made it unpleasant at times, especially because later on at night she could not rest because of all the noise from the street (everyone was shouting and speaking very loudly). Afterwards, her face hurt and her body was very red and dirty. The red colouring was so hard to remove, she had to shower five times! It was very hot in the street and she needed to drink water hourly. Despite this, it was a cheap but exciting event, costing only 10 euros.

Identifies whether or not Marisol would be likely to return to Tomatina in the future.

For example, she most likely would not like to return because:

- there were a lot of people
- she did not have rest at night
- her body was red and dirty
- she had to shower five times

She might like to return because it was a fun and interesting experience. Explains whether or not Marisol would be likely to return to Tomatina in the future. Uses examples from the passage, makes links.

For example, she most likely would not like to return because:

- there were too many people
- after Tomatina, her face was hurting, her body was very red, and she was very dirty
- she had to shower five times to make the red colour go away
- it was hot in the street and she needed to drink water
- she could not rest at night because there was so much noise (people were shouting and talking loudly in the street).

Presents a thorough explanation as to whether or not Marisol would be likely to return to Tomatina in the future. Draws conclusions and justifications.

For example:

Though there were many good things about Tomatina and the festival was an exciting experience, it is unlikely Marisol would return. She thought it was too crowded and it was difficult to sleep because of all of the noise from the street. After the festival, her face was sore, her body was very red, and she had to take five showers to get rid of the red colour. It was also very hot in the street and she had to drink a lot of water. Despite this, she did enjoy herself and it was a cheap and exciting event, costing only 10 euros.

Possible evidence showing understanding of which job is best suited to Camila, and why. The best choice of job for Camila is flight attendant. Earning a lot of money is not important to her, but she wants to spend a lot of time with people and help them. Tourism interests her a lot, and she can use her French and English knowledge when she travels. Her passion for history and geography also mean she is well-suited to a job with a lot of travel.

The other professions would not work for her. She says she does not want to work in a restaurant as a waitress because she used to wash dishes and it was terrible and stressful. Being a doctor would not suit her as she doesn't like working in an office and she isn't studying science. Being a teacher would also be unsuitable as she knows that she doesn't have much patience for or get along with children.

Other careers / jobs possible with valid justification.

For example:

- The job best suited to Camila is flight attendant, because she likes to have contact with people and money is not important to her. She likes tourism.
- Camila might like to be a doctor because she likes to have contact with people.
- The job not suited to Camila is waitress, as she doesn't want to work in a restaurant.

For example:

The job best suited to Camila is flight attendant, because she likes to have contact with people and money is not important to her. She is very interested in tourism because she can use her English and French, and she loves to explore new places. She wants to travel the world.

The other professions are not as well suited to her because she doesn't want to work in a restaurant and she doesn't like office work. Being a doctor would not suit her and her lack of patience with children would rule out being a teacher.

The job best suited to Camila is flight attendant, because she likes to have contact with people and money is not important to her. She likes to help people. Tourism interests her a lot as she can use her English and French and she enjoys exploring different places. She does very well in geography, which may also be of advantage to her in a flight attendant job.

The other professions are not as well suited to her because she doesn't want to work in a restaurant as a waitress (she used to wash dishes and it was terrible and stressful). Being a doctor would not suit her as she doesn't want to work in an office. Being a teacher would also not suit her as she knows that she does not have much patience or get along well with children.
