She noticed a serious problem in her community – limited access to healthcare – and did something about it.</i> • Her robot is especially useful for those who belong to rural communities where the lack of doctors is a serious problem. • This robot will help <i>people in rural zones to seek treatment sooner, and potentially save lives.</i> • Ángela is now working with the city council, pharmacies, and doctors of Papantla, to spread her tool to even more villages, thus continuing to improve the quality of life for the largest possible number of people. • Maybe the most impressive thing is that it is capable of speaking Spanish and Totonaca, an indigenous language of Mexico. • <i>This is inspirational because this robot's impact will be widespread as it is accessible for communities without internet and for communities that may not speak Spanish.</i> • With the money that she won from her international prize, she dreams of building a science classroom in her own community, in order to inspire more
