<p><i>Possible evidence showing understanding of why Mikaela explored her Chinese heritage.</i></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mikaela explored her Chinese heritage because she became deeply interested in her family history after hearing the story of her great-grandfather, Mr Zhou, who immigrated to New Zealand from China in 1920. She heard that when her great-grandfather first arrived in New Zealand, many people were not welcoming, and life was very difficult for him. Later, he started a family with a Māori woman named Alice, and they had children together. Although life was hard for them at that time, her great-grandparents worked every day and never took a rest, all to provide a good life for their family. Gradually, their lives improved. Now, Mikaela’s family has grown to over 100 people. • Learning about her great-grandfather’s struggles and perseverance inspired her to visit his hometown in China, where Mikaela felt a strong sense of connection to her roots when she saw many family photos in his old house, despite never having been there before, nor being able to understand the language or culture there. • Additionally, she really likes her Chinese name, ‘Mee-Sahn’, given by her mother, which reflects her cultural background. She is called Mee-Sahn at home and at school. • Mikaela’s exploration also aligns with her belief that understanding different cultures – including her own – helps foster unity and a more inclusive society in New Zealand. There are many different cultures in New Zealand, and people’s attitudes towards immigrants are becoming more friendly. Some Chinese people have even started learning about Māori language and culture. It can handle other tasks, like preparing for listening and speaking exercises and language games when learning languages. • AI can help teachers find students' learning habits more quickly, so teachers can adjust their plans and give students better support. • AI can create a personalised learning plan for each student, helping them organise their studies. The students also felt that AI was very helpful. • Students can come up with their own opinions after first learning of other people's through AI. • As long as teachers teach students when they can use AI and how to use it, students should be fine to use AI.
