The National Certificate in Dance (Level 3) is designed as a national qualification to:

- provide a level of knowledge, skills and competence in dance to permit and assist a pathway to further education and training;
- meet specific industry profiles for people entering the workforce as dancers or as other members of the dance industry.

This qualification recognises demonstrated knowledge and skills in the dance domains of performance, choreography, and perspectives. It enables the development of specialised knowledge and skills in Dance and other specified Arts and Crafts sub-fields.
