Employment / Cultural / Community pathway

Graduates may apply to enter the *Heke Reo Māori* at Te Wānanga o Raukawa.

Graduates will be Māori speakers and role models well placed to nurture and support the revitalisation of te reo within their whānau and community.

The language and knowledge gained from this qualification is applicable in a wide range of forums and roles where te reo and tikanga Māori are valued including: rūnanga, kōhanga reo, kura, schools, councils, iwi organisations, broadcasting agencies, government departments and a range of other organisations.

Ngā kaupapa/guiding principles

Te Reo

Supporting people to re-engage their whānau with tikanga and te reo Māori to increase the use of te reo in the home and community contributes directly to the survival of the Māori language.

Rangatiratanga

Providing whānau with the ability to express themselves in their own language is one way to exercise selfdetermination.

Manaakitanga

Contextual knowledge of tikanga and associated language to manaaki people facilitates the expression of manaakitanga.

Whanaungatanga

Use of te reo Māori in whānau activities in the home and community assist the expression of whanaungatanga.

Kotahitanga

Kotahitanga is expressed by whānau working together to enhance the language learning environment.

Pükengatanga

Pūkengatanga is expressed by advancing competency in te reo Māori.

Ūkaipōtanga

The ability to describe connections to waka, maunga, awa, iwi, hapū and marae in te reo strengthens a person's sense of belonging.

Whakapapa

Whakapapa is promoted through language learning that connects students with tūpuna and other whanaunga.

Wairuatanga

Wairuatanga is expressed by learning and speaking te reo Māori daily to nourish wairua.

Kaitiakitanga

Students are encouraged to be guardians and promoters of the language of their whānau and tūpuna.
