Pārongo aromatawai me te taumata paearu | Assessment information and grade criteria*Assessment specifications:*

A *construction environment* is any environment where construction, modification, or maintenance of buildings, structures, or infrastructure assets takes place.

Legislative frameworks refer to the relationship between legislation and other approved components to achieve the purpose of Acts as they relate to construction environments.

Legislative requirements refer to approved industry components in the legislative framework. These may include Rules, Standards, Approved Codes of Practice, local council bylaws, and industry good practice guidelines.
