Pārongo aromatawai me te taumata paearu | Assessment information and grade criteria

For assessment purposes:

- Evidence for the practical components of this skill standard must be generated in a youth development setting.
- Evidence for this standard must reflect best practice in youth development including legal, cultural and ethical considerations. Practice must follow organisational policies and procedures.

Definitions:

- Taiohi* refers to young people between 12 and 24 years of age.
- Youth development* refers to the biological, social, emotional, and cognitive growth of children and adolescents, along with the support and services that communities offer to meet their needs and nurture their overall development.

Ihirangi waitohu | Indicative content

- Sociological factors impacting taiohi, such as – poverty, colonisation, social media, globalisation, sub-cultures, global warming, generational abuse, diversity and inclusion, spirituality, conflict and war.
- Historical factors impacting taiohi, such as – wars, civil rights movements, economic crises, technological advancements, and social changes.
- Economic systems and structures impacting taiohi, such as – student loan debt, housing affordability, entry-level job prospects, and economic mobility.

- Policies and legislative processes in addressing key issues affecting taiohi, such as – education, employment, healthcare, social welfare, climate change, political participation.
