Assessment specifications:

All activities must be carried out in accordance with workplace health and safety requirements and the Code of Welfare: Horses and Donkeys.

All activities must be carried out in accordance with the Rules of Racing.

Safety gear worn by the rider must meet the standards of New Zealand Thoroughbred Racing (NZTR).

All activities relevant to this standard must reflect ngā kaupapa (the principles) o te Tiriti o Waitangi.

All activities must, as relevant to candidates and/or this standard, reflect the peoples of the Pacific and other cultures, and their world views.

Ākonga/learners should be assessed against this standard in a real-life context using naturally occurring evidence.

Verification of practical competency must be carried out by an NZTR nominated person such as a riding mentor or Racing Integrity Board (RIB) before final sign off by the Assessor as per NZTR licensing requirements.

Range

For the purposes of assessment criteria listed above:

- artificial aids whip, spurs.
- The workout includes riding between fences, on approach to the fence, over the fence, on landing.
- Feedback to trainers includes information on the horse's mental attitude, ability to carry out work required, regularity of paces, willingness to perform, jumping efforts.
- In company must include with at least one other thoroughbred jumps horse and rider who are keeping pace.

- Schooling methods and individual horse behaviours to consider when schooling.
- Types of fences and their construction.
- Appropriate and safe techniques for riding racehorses approaching and over fences, and when landing.
- Types of natural and artificial aids and their uses.
- New Zealand Rules of Racing regarding the use of natural and artificial aids.
- Riding techniques to encourage horse to achieve their maximum potential.
- Health and safety requirements and the use of personal protective equipment.
- Relevant animal welfare legislation and guidelines.

Riding in company

- Pacework when riding in company.
- How horses react to riding in company and techniques for managing horses.
- Techniques for maintaining a line between and over fences.
- Ways to avoid interference with other horses.
- Awareness of following riding instructions.

Communication with the trainer

- Notification processes for reporting horse's progress.
- Industry accepted practices for greeting the trainer.
- Listening skills and clarification of details when unclear.
- Mentally noting horse's performance during the workout, and relating relevant details to the trainer.
