Guidance Information

- 1 For this assessment, it is expected the original version of the whakaraka is used in accordance with iwi, hapū, or whānau tradition. This is intended to preserve the integrity of the whakaraka and the knowledge within it.
- 2 For outcome 2, the essential skills of whakaraka are to be demonstrated without the use of aids, i.e. words are memorised.
- 3 Assessment

This unit standard is intended for learners of whakaraka. Assessment of skills may occur within a learning situation or a public performance, and in individual or group settings. However, each candidate must demonstrate individual competence.

4 Iwi, hapū, or whānau tradition is incorporated in assessment against this unit standard. Iwi, hapū, or whānau tradition refers to performance features and/or styles unique to an iwi, hapū, or whānau, and may include such things as movement, body movement, posture, stance, and/or lyrics. It is expected that candidates follow the iwi, hapū, or whānau traditions of each whakaraka used in assessment. Other iwi, hapū, or whānau variations may be explored in order to enrich and enhance understanding.

- 5 Demonstrate in-depth knowledge of whakaraka and the essential skills of whakaraka with purpose will be evidenced through:
 - describing the categories of whakaraka in depth;
 - identifying performance variations and/or similarities within or between whakaraka categories,
 - explaining whakaraka in depth;
 - identifying the meaning of lyrics or waiata accompanying the whakaraka,
 - demonstrating essential skills with purpose;
 - kia hāngai te kori o te tinana ki te wairua o te whakaraka, ā, kia tika te tū (performing with deliberate movements and appropriate actions, which are relevant to the whakaraka).
- 6 Demonstrate comprehensive knowledge of whakaraka, and the essential skills of whakaraka with artistic expression will be evidenced through:
 - comprehensively describing the categories of whakaraka;
 - identifying the background to and/or development of each whakaraka category,
 - comprehensively explaining whakaraka;
 - describing the purpose of each whakaraka,
 - demonstrating essential skills with artistic expression;
 - kia tika te mahi tahi o te ringa me te kori o te tinana (hand actions are in synergy with the body),
 - kia pakari te tū me te korikori o te tinana, ā, puta ana ngā mahi auaha (movements are performed with creativity and confidence).
- 7 Glossary

Essential skills refer to the core features or basic performance competencies of a whakaraka including lyrics and accompanying waiata.

Features refer to body movements or actions; the use of voice and/or song; the use of any tools or props, and the materials to make them; and desired outcome or goal specific to the category of whakaraka;

Movement refers to expressions of performance such as wiri, takahi, whātero or whētero, mahi ā-ringa, pūkana or whākana (i te wā tika);

Performance refers to the vocal and visual presentation of whakaraka;

Tikanga refers to the rules, purpose, and any accompanying lyrics or waiata; *Whakaraka* is used as a term to describe hand, stick and string games, referring in particular to the dexterity required for these activities.

- 8 It is encouraged that the concepts of ihi, wehi, and wana are explored to provide learners with a meaningful understanding of the essential skills when performed at a higher level.
- 9 Where applicable, ākonga are encouraged to reference. Referencing will prepare ākonga for academic writing.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Demonstrate knowledge of whakaraka.

Performance criteria

1.1 Categories of whakaraka are described in terms of their features.

Range	categories of whakaraka include:
	hand games – hei tama tū tama, whakaropiropi, materawa,
	toropiko, hipitoitoi, ana parepare, tahi te parapara;
	stick games – tī rākau, tītī tōrea;
	string games – ngā mahi whai;
	evidence of three categories is required.

- 1.2 Whakaraka are described in terms of their tikanga.
 - Range evidence of one whakaraka from each category is required.

Outcome 2

Demonstrate the essential skills of whakaraka.

Range evidence of the performance of two whakaraka categories is required.

Performance criteria

2.1 Appropriate body movement and voice, and correct pronunciation are demonstrated in accordance with iwi, hapū, or whānau tradition, and/or the tikanga of the whakaraka.
