- 2 Definition

Workplace procedures – the procedures and standards set by the client or employing organisation. Workplace procedures should reflect equipment manufacturer's requirements, and current legislation.

- 3 For the purposes of assessment:
 - evidence must be presented in accordance with workplace procedures.
 - assessment for the practical components of this unit standard must be supplied from a commercial horse enterprise or recognised voluntary equine organisation.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Prepare a horse and remove a shoe.

Performance criteria

- 1.1 Assemble shoeing equipment.
 - Range may include but is not limited to hoof knife, rasp, shoe puller, nail puller, clinches, hammer, nails.
- 1.2 Restrain the horse in a calm and comfortable position while standing.
- 1.3 Pick up the horse's foot and hold in a position comfortable for the horse and handler.
- 1.4 Remove the shoe and nails without causing damage to hoof.
- 1.5 Clean the underside of the hoof to remove foreign matter and replace the foot on the ground without damage to the hoof.

Outcome 2

Assess a hoof and replace a shoe on a horse.

Range temporary until a farrier arrives.

Performance criteria

2.1 Identify hoof problems in terms of probable cause and remedial action.

Range four of – stone bruise, punctured sole, thrush, cracked heels, mud fever, sandcracks, corns, seedy toe, pricked foot.

- 2.2 Assess hoof damage to determine viability of replacing shoe.
- 2.3 Shape the shoe to ensure the surface of shoe in contact with hoof is level, smooth, in contact with hoof around edge, and shoe shape corresponds with shape of grounded surface of hoof.
- 2.4 Nail the shoe to the hoof.

Range using white line as a guide, with a maximum of four nails (two on each side of foot), using nail size suitable for the shoe, with bevelled side of nail facing centre hoof.

2.5 Finish nails.

Range by cutting and bending on hoof wall to ensure tight shoe fit, with protruding areas filed smooth.

2.6 Record actions carried out and make available to the farrier.

Outcome 3

Attend to post-shoeing activities.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 Remove debris from shoeing.
- 3.2 Clean and store shoeing tools in a dry, accessible place.
- 3.3 Return the horse to designated area.
