Purpose	People credited with this unit standard are able to describe, in accordance with ngā kōrero tuku iho: the key events which led to the Colonial wars of the 1800s; the Colonial wars of the 1800s; and in detail one of the wars between Māori and Pākehā which took place during the 1800s.

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Guidance Information

- 1 The basic principles underpinning tikanga are common, but while there are some constants, the details of performance of tikanga, and their explanation, may differ. These differences may be at a rohe, iwi, hapū, whānau, or marae level. The context of the learning should include the tikanga of the local mana whenua (if capable), but learning others' tikanga is also encouraged. This is in order to enrich and enhance understanding of tikanga, and the associated reo.

- 3 **Definition**
Ngā kōrero tuku iho are Māori stories, or histories, which provide a basis or rationale for Māori belief systems and tikanga. They may be found in Māori oral traditions (such as pūrākau, pakiwaitara, whakapapa, waiata, karanga, or whaikōrero) or in written works. They may also be particular to a marae, whānau, hapū, rohe, or iwi; and are often revered as treasured accounts to be passed down the generations.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Describe the key events which led to the Colonial wars of the 1800s in accordance with ngā kōrero tuku iho.

Performance criteria

- 1.1 The initial settlement by British settlers and subsequent demand for land are described.
- 1.2 The signing of the Declaration of Independence and the Treaty of Waitangi is described in the context of the Colonial wars.
- 1.3 British efforts to impose sovereignty over Aotearoa is described in terms of confrontation with Māori.
- 1.4 The introduction of ordinances and legislation is described in terms of those which led to forced confrontation with Māori.

Outcome 2

Describe the Colonial wars of the 1800s in accordance with ngā kōrero tuku iho.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 The wars which broke out prior to the 1860s are described.

Range must include but is not limited to – who was involved, reason for the war, where it took place, when it took place, numbers killed.
- 2.2 The major wars of the 1860s are described in terms of providing the turning point for Pākehā rule.

Range major wars may include but are not limited to – Waikato, Taranaki, Tauranga.
- 2.3 The outcomes of war are described for the parties involved.

Range outcomes may include but are not limited to – numbers killed, amount of land settled and alienated, relationships between parties.

Outcome 3

Describe in detail one of the wars between Māori and Pākehā which took place during the 1800s in accordance with ngā kōrero tuku iho.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 The key events are described in terms of those which led to the war.
- 3.2 The key events are described in terms of those which comprised the war.
- 3.3 The outcomes of the war are described for each of the parties involved.
- 3.4 The changes in the status and position of the iwi are described in terms of before and after the war.
