

Title	Describe the dispossession of Māori land and its effects

Purpose	People credited with this unit standard are able to describe: ways in which dispossession of Māori land occurred; historical events leading to dispossession of Māori land; and the effects of the dispossession of Māori land from the time it occurred until the present.

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Guidance Information

- 1 The basic principles underpinning tikanga are common, but while there are some constants, the details of performance of tikanga, and their explanation, may differ. These differences may be at a rohe, iwi, hapū, whānau, or marae level. The context of the learning should include the tikanga of the local mana whenua (if capable), but learning others' tikanga is also encouraged. This is in order to enrich and enhance understanding of tikanga, and the associated reo.

- 3 Interaction between Māori and Pākehā prior to 1840 varied considerably in different areas. While areas such as the North were heavily involved in trade, religion and commerce, others like the central North Island remained isolated with little contact during this period. It is envisaged that students will gain an appreciation of the local situation, the situation in one other area as well as national trends.
- 4 A range of nationalities were defined as Pākehā by the Māori during this period, such as the Americans, French, Russians and the British.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Describe ways in which dispossession of Māori land occurred.

Performance criteria

- 1.1 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the ways in which wars were used to this effect.
- 1.2 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of how legislation was introduced to this effect.
- 1.3 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the role of the Māori Land Court in dispossessing Māori land.
- 1.4 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of illegal tactics used by groups and individuals in dispossessing Māori land.

Range groups and individuals may include but are not limited to – Colonial government, New Zealand government, local government, Pākehā entrepreneurs and companies, settlers, politicians and governors, missionary groups, Māori entrepreneurs.

Outcome 2

Describe historical events leading to dispossession of Māori land.

Range evidence for one iwi or rohe is required.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the status and position of iwi or rohe before and after the loss of land.
- 2.2 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the circumstances leading to the dispossession of the land.
- 2.3 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the actions of the key groups and/or individuals involved.

Outcome 3

Describe the effects of the dispossession of Māori land from the time it occurred until the present.

Range effects may include – economic effects, political effects, effects on morale, psychological effects, effects on health, social effects; evidence of two different situations is required.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the immediate effects for the dispossessed.
- 3.2 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the resulting flow-on effects for the dispossessed.
- 3.3 The dispossession of Māori land is described in terms of the present position of the dispossessed within the context of the dispossession and its effects.
