1.1 Describe individual items in a first aid kit in terms of their uses and method of application.

may include but is not limited to – bandages, gauze, scissors, antiseptics, antiseptic cream, antibiotic cream, wound dressing, hot and cold packs, skin treatments, thermometer, Epsom salts, liniment, nose twitch, balter:

liniment, nose twitch, halter; evidence of twelve is required.

1.2 Describe the course of action to take in an emergency situation which is in the best interests of the horse and meets Code of Welfare: Horses and Donkeys (2018) requirements.

emergency situations may include but are not limited to – open wound, closed wound, fracture, horse caught in wire, cast horse, colic. dvstocia:

evidence of four is required.

1.3 Describe why veterinary assistance should be called in an emergency situation in terms of legal and ethical requirements.

Range includes but is not limited to – expertise, administration of

restricted drugs, legal obligations, ongoing advice.

Outcome 2

Act in the event of an emergency and provide assistance while veterinary treatment is being carried out.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 Act in an emergency situation which is in the best interests of the horse and in accordance with Code of Welfare: Horses and Donkeys (2018) requirements and workplace procedures.
- 2.2 Hold the horse for the veterinarian and apply restraints in a manner that is safe for the veterinarian, the handler and the horse in accordance with workplace procedures.

Range may include but is not limited to – halter and rope, skin twitch,

nose twitch, leg held up; evidence of two is required.

Outcome 3

Care for a convalescing horse as instructed by the veterinarian and describe the prescribed veterinary treatment, and management of proud flesh.

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Performance criteria

- 3.1 Describe the prescribed veterinarian treatment in terms of its rationale.
- 3.2 Administer treatments according to veterinary instruction as part of the on-going convalescence in accordance with workplace procedures.

Range may include but is not limited to – powders, paste, inflammatory

controls, bandaging;

evidence of three is required.

- 3.3 Provide the horse with the rapeutic exercise as instructed by the veterinarian.
- 3.4 Provide the horse with feed that aids health and digestion in the process of recovery in accordance with workplace procedures.
- 3.5 Describe how proud flesh forms, the reasons for it forming during healing, and methods for prevention and/or removal.
