2 Definitions

The *Code* refers to The Official New Zealand Truck Loading Code – Code of Practice for the Safety of Loads on Heavy Vehicles.

Industry best practice refers to an industry accepted method of achieving a high standard of outcome that meets industry needs and represents value for money. The *Rule* refers to the Land Transport Rule: Dangerous Goods 2005.

Safely means without injury to any person or animal, without damage to any property (including vehicle, equipment or load) or the environment, and in compliance with the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015.

Workplace procedures refer to organisation policies and procedures that are documented in memo, electronic, or manual format and available in the workplace. They may include but are not limited to – standard operating procedures, site specific procedures, site safety procedures, equipment operating procedures, quality assurance procedures, product quality specifications, manufacturer's requirements, references, approved codes of practice, housekeeping standards, environmental considerations, on-site briefings, supervisor's instructions, and procedures to comply with legislative and local body requirements relevant to the commercial road transport sector.

3 Assessment information

Evidence presented for assessment against this unit standard must be consistent with safe working practices and be in accordance with applicable service information, workplace procedures and legislative requirements.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Load dangerous goods.

Performance criteria

- 1.1 Vehicle is loaded safely in accordance with the safety requirements of the Rule.
- 1.2 Where vehicle is being used to transport bulk liquid dangerous goods, vehicle is secured against movement and checked for leaks.
- 1.3 The labelling on packaged dangerous goods is checked to ensure it complies with the Rule.
- 1.4 Packaged dangerous goods containers are checked for damage.
- 1.5 The goods to be loaded are checked to ensure they are in accordance with delivery documentation, Dangerous Goods Declaration, and legal and organisational requirements.
- 1.6 Variations between actual and planned load figures are identified and reported.
- 1.7 Goods are segregated as required by the Rule.

1.8 Vehicle is inspected to ensure it complies with the placarding requirements of the Rule.

- 1.9 The weight of the load is distributed evenly across the vehicle, and the load is secured using appropriate equipment in accordance with the Code.
- 1.10 Dangerous Goods Declaration and safety data sheet are confirmed as being complete and are secured in the vehicle in accordance with legal requirements.
- 1.11 Emergency procedure documentation is checked as appropriate for the product being carried and secured in the vehicle in accordance with legal requirements.
- 1.12 Vehicle is inspected to ensure it carries emergency equipment as required by the Rule.

Outcome 2

Convey dangerous goods by road transport.

Performance criteria

2.1 The vehicle is driven safely in accordance with legal requirements and in a manner that is appropriate for the goods being carried.

Outcome 3

Unload dangerous goods.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 Vehicle is unloaded safely in accordance with the safety requirements of the Rule.
- 3.2 Unloading is completed and unloading equipment is secured.
- 3.3 Delivery and load documentation are completed to reflect any changes in the load.
