- 2 For the purposes of this unit standard, evidence requirements may be limited to one museum.
- 3 Definitions

Museum includes museums, art galleries, whare taonga, tribal museums, cultural and community centres holding public collections, science centres, interpretive centres, exhibition centres, and historic places.

Tangata whenua – indigenous people of Aotearoa and their language and culture. *Taonga* are tangible and intangible items of cultural and social significance to Māori. *Tikanga* – Māori principles, practices, or behaviours.

4 Iwi, hapū and whānau variation with regard to tikanga, kawa and Te Reo Māori is acknowledged.

Outcome 1

Demonstrate knowledge of relationships between tangata whenua and museums in terms of the Te Tiriti o Waitangi and cultural contexts.

Performance criteria

- 1.1 Responsibilities and obligations of museums with regard to the Te Tiriti o Waitangi are explained.
 - Range includes but is not limited to article 2 of the Te Tiriti o Waitangi.
- 1.2 Cultural documents produced by international agencies are explained in relation to the responsibilities and obligations of museums to indigenous peoples.
 - Range may include but is not limited to Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples; Continuous Cultures, Ongoing Responsibilities; Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act; evidence of one international or foreign cultural document is required.
- 1.3 Contemporary Māori social structures and concepts and how they inform museum practice are explained.
 - Range iwi, hapū, whānau, waka, maunga, urban.
- 1.4 Significant developments in the museum sector that reflect tikanga Māori are explained.
 - Range may include but is not limited to *Te Māori* Exhibition; cogovernance structures, policies and personnel, Aotearoa New Zealand history school curriculum, Te Papa, Matariki; evidence of three significant developments is required.
- 1.5 Māori concepts that inform museum practice are explained.
 - Range taonga, koha, tapu, wairua, mauri, noa, mana whenua, tangata whenua, tangata Tiriti, kawa, tikanga, kaitiakitanga, tino rangatiratanga, mana, manaakitanga.

Outcome 2

Demonstrate knowledge of tikanga Māori in museums in terms of customer care.

Performance criteria

2.1 Tikanga associated with the hosting of Māori visitors in a museum are explained.

Range iwi, hapū, or whānau expectations; manaakitanga, mana whenua.

2.2 Powhiri and mihi and their relevance to the museum are explained.

Outcome 3

Demonstrate knowledge of tikanga Māori in terms of museum collections.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 Custodianship is explained.
 - Range whakapapa of taonga, kaitiakitanga, legal concepts of ownership.
- 3.2 Tikanga associated with taonga in museum collections is explained.

Range karakia, role of kaumātua, tikanga.

3.3 Information required for the documentation of taonga is described.

Range identification of – iwi, hapū, whānau; language requirements, terminology.

3.4 Security and safety factors are explained.

Range includes but is not limited to – cultural safety, tikanga.

3.5 Access considerations are explained in accordance with museum tikanga, policy, process and practice.

Range may include – memorandum of understanding, tapu, iwi rights, intellectual property rights, loans, use for tangi, ceremonial use; evidence of three considerations is required.

Outcome 4

Demonstrate knowledge of the importance of engagement with Māori when planning museum public programmes.

Performance criteria

4.1 The need for hui within Māori public programme planning is explained.

- 4.2 The need for appropriate interpretation and display of taonga is explained.
- 4.3 A museum education programme with a Māori focus is explained.
 - Range may include but is not limited to kura kaupapa Māori, reo rumaki, whare wānanga.
- 4.4 A museum public programme with Māori focus is explained.
 - Range may include but is not limited to workshop, hui, wānanga, tour, demonstration, lecture, performance event, community event.
