Guidance Information

- 1 Reo Māori media refers to the use of te reo Māori incorporating tikanga, and kaupapa Māori in the media.
- 2 The presentation of information must be conducted in te reo Māori.
- 3 The unit standard can be assessed in a work-based environment, or in a training and education environment if simulated media and Māori culture conditions are provided, or in a combination of both environments.
- 4 Definitions

Central government processes refer to the processes of parliament, government departments and agencies, and electoral processes.

External Māori groups refer to groups such as iwi or hapū based groups, urban Māori organisations, and national Māori organisations.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Identify and explain the structures of the New Zealand parliamentary system and its relationship to Māori politics and representation.

Performance criteria

1.1 Local representatives are identified and explained in terms of their relationship to Māori politics and representation. These may include but is not limited to – electoral processes, House of Representatives, caucus, political parties, parliamentary decision-making processes, the role of government agencies and non-government agencies.

Range evidence of two is required.

1.2 Current Māori parliamentary representation is identified and explained in terms of its relationship to Māori politics and representation.

Range may include – Māori members of parliament, Māori seats and electorates.

Outcome 2

Explain the participation of iwi in central government processes.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 The aims of external Māori groups are identified and explained in terms of participation in central government processes.
- 2.2 The engagement strategy of the iwi in terms of their participation in central government is identified and explained.

Range may include – representation, mandate, strategies used in lobbying parliament, ministries, or government departments to bring about positive outcomes for Māori.

2.3 Positive and negative outcomes for iwi in terms of participation in central government are identified and explained.

Range includes two positive and two negative outcomes.

Outcome 3

Analyse processes that impact on reo Māori media reporting on government issues, events, and state occasions.

Performance criteria

3.1 The accreditation processes for gaining entry to reporting on government and state occasions are analysed.

Range government house, state occasions.

The processes and protocols for gaining interviews with members of parliament and other crown representatives are analysed.
