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Explanatory notes

1 Definitions

The definition of a *crane* is as given in the Health and Safety in Employment (Pressure Equipment, Cranes, and Passenger Ropeways) Regulations 1999. Hydraulic handi crane – a battery operated crane with control functions connected to the handle. The handle is also part of the steering process

- 2 Assessment
 - Assessment must be carried out in a crane workplace or equivalent.
- All tasks are to be carried out in accordance with the equipment manufacturers' requirements and company standards and procedures based on industry requirements in:
 - a company quality management systems;
 - b health and safety requirements and guidelines consistent with the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 (HSE Act);
 - c equipment manufacturers' operating instructions;
 - d government and local government legislation, regulations, and bylaws;
 - e *Crane Safety Manual*, published by the Crane Association of New Zealand (Inc), PO Box 25 156, Panama Street, Wellington 6146;
 - f Approved Code of Practice for Load-Lifting Rigging, published by the Occupational Safety and Health Service of the Department of Labour, available at http://www.osh.govt.nz;
 - g Approved Code of Practice for Cranes, published by the Occupational Safety and Health Service of the Department of Labour, available at http://www.osh.govt.nz.

4 Assessment

For the purposes of assessment of outcome 2, the lift plan must be supplied to the candidate.

Outcomes and evidence requirements

Outcome 1

Inspect the worksite, assess the load, and assess the hydraulic handi crane for suitability for the task.

Evidence requirements

1.1 Worksite is inspected for existing and potential hazards in accordance with company procedures.

Range may include but is not limited to – access, egress, proximity to

process plant, congestion, overhead service lines, electrical equipment, permanent structures, unauthorised people.

- 1.2 Hazards and potential hazards are managed in accordance with company procedures.
- 1.3 Load is assessed in accordance with company procedures.

Range includes but is not limited to – weight, dimensions, centre of

gravity (COG), sling points.

1.4 Crane is assessed for suitability for the task in accordance with the results of load assessment and hazard identification.

Outcome 2

Carry out hydraulic handi crane pre-use inspection checks, and set up, configure, and confirm the lift plan.

Evidence requirements

- 2.1 Crane is inspected prior to use in accordance with manufacturer's recommendations and company procedures.
- 2.2 Crane is authorised for use and delivered to the lift location in accordance with company procedures.
- 2.3 Crane is configured, positioned, and set up for lifting at the lift site in accordance with manufacturer's recommendations.
- The lift plan is confirmed with all personnel involved, and people in the area of operations, in accordance with company procedures.

Outcome 3

Select lifting equipment for the hydraulic handi crane, and sling the load.

Evidence requirements

- 3.1 Lifting equipment is selected in accordance with company procedures and the *Approved Code of Practice for Load-Lifting Rigging.*
 - Range includes but is not limited to chains, fittings, wire rope slings, nylon web slings, shackles.
- 3.2 Lifting equipment is inspected for defects in accordance with the *Approved Code of Practice for Load-Lifting Rigging* and company procedures.
 - Range includes but is not limited to cracks, stretch, wear, rust, damage, cuts, burns, chemical attack.
- 3.3 Load is slung in accordance with the *Approved Code of Practice for Load-Lifting Rigging.*

Outcome 4

Check the load, and lift, travel and place loads with a hydraulic handi crane.

Evidence requirements

- 4.1 Crane takes the weight in accordance with crane manufacturer's recommendations, and company procedures.
- 4.2 Load is checked for the presence of hazards in accordance with company procedures.
- 4.3 Load is lifted, and placed in accordance with crane manufacturer's requirements, *Approved Code of Practice for Cranes*, and company procedures.
- 4.4 Crane is travelled with a suspended load in accordance with crane manufacturer's recommendations.
- 4.5 Crane remains stable throughout the load lifting, travelling, and placing operation.
