Guidance Information

1 Tikanga

Tikanga are values, principles, processes, and practices exercised by Māori in their daily lives. These reflect the concepts upon which they are based and provide guidelines for appropriate behaviour and conduct in Māori society. They also prescribe consequences for any breaches or when tikanga is not followed. They can be particular to rohe, hapori, marae, whānau, hapū and/or iwi.

- 2 The basic principles underpinning tikanga are common, but while there are some constants, the details of performance of tikanga, and their explanation, may differ. These differences may be at a rohe, hapori, marae, whānau, hapū, iwi level. The context of the learning should include the tikanga of the local mana whenua (if capable) but learning others' tikanga is also encouraged. This is in order to enrich and enhance understanding, knowledge and practice of tikanga, and the associated reo.
- 3 Definitions

Distinguishing features are behaviours, beliefs, values, location, participants and practices that are determined by the kaupapa of a hui.

Kaupapa of hui include gatherings of a social, political, ceremonial, spiritual, economic, or cultural nature. Examples of hui include – tangihanga, hui ā-tau, Te Matatini, mārena, hui tōrangapū, whakapāha (Pukehinahina, Rangiriri, Rangiaowhia, Ōrākau, Te Tarata etc).

Location refers not only to the name of the city or town, or the marae the hui takes place, but also the finer detail. For example, because of the kaupapa, a hui may take place in the wharekai, the wharenui, or out on the marae ātea.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Demonstrate knowledge of the distinguishing features determined by the kaupapa of a hui.

- 1.5 The participants are identified in terms of the kaupapa of the hui.
- 1.6 The practices are explained in terms of the kaupapa of the hui.
