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Explanatory notes

- 2 Definitions
Distribution facility refers to a workplace where the primary focus is on storage and distribution of stock.
Organisational procedures referred to in this unit standard may include but are not limited to the applicable procedures found in the following: organisational performance guidelines and standards; manufacturer's procedures and specifications; Government and local body legislation
Retail facility refers to a workplace where the primary focus is on customers purchasing goods or services.
- 3 Legislation relevant to this unit standard includes but is not limited to: Hazardous Substances and New Organisms Act 1996.
- 4 Wrapping equipment used for assessment against this unit standard may be automated or manually operated.

Outcomes and evidence requirements

Outcome 1

Package goods in a retail or distribution facility.

Range evidence of three different goods.

Evidence requirements

1.1 Internal and external requirements for packaging selected goods are explained.

Range packing requirements could include but are not limited to – packaging strength and material, stacking methods, use of space, labelling, documentation, organisational procedures, hazardous materials.

1.2 Methods of stacking of packaged goods are described in terms of determining factors.

Range factors may include but are not limited to – product (size, shape, strength), available space, destination, mode of transport.

1.3 Goods are packaged, stacked, and identified in accordance with organisational procedures.

Outcome 2

Apply outer wrapping to goods using wrapping equipment in a retail or distribution facility.

Range evidence for three different goods is required.

Evidence requirements

2.1 The functions and characteristics of wrapping equipment are explained in terms of its capabilities and limitations.

Range capabilities and limitations may include but are not limited to – product size, shape, weight, equipment speed, wrapping strength, maintenance requirements.

2.2 Goods wrapping requirements are identified and goods wrapped in accordance with organisational procedures.

Range wrapping requirements related to – product type, stacking method, destination of goods, mode of transportation.

2.3 Any legislative requirements relating to nature of the goods are identified and appropriate measures are applied in accordance with organisational procedures.

Outcome 3

Maintain wrapping equipment in a retail or distribution facility.

Evidence requirements

3.1 Maintenance procedures for wrapping equipment are applied in accordance with organisational procedures and manufacturer's specifications.

- 3.2 Equipment maintenance work is recorded in accordance with organisational procedures.
