<b>Purpose</b>	<p>This unit standard is for people in the hairdressing industry who wish to develop elementary hair setting skills.</p> <p>People credited with this unit standard are able to: describe how hair setting techniques and physical factors influence finished styles; prepare to set short hair for volume; set and dress short hair for volume; and complete follow-up actions.</p>

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**Explanatory notes**

- 1 Definitions  
*Legislative requirements* refer to the obligations of the employer and/or employee under the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 and Health (Hairdressers) Regulations 1980.  
*Set short hair for volume* refers to styles requiring the use of rollers on a full head in order to create volume. Some pincurls may be used as required.  
*Short hair* means hair length above the shoulders.
- 2 In this unit standard all work must comply with legislative requirements and must ensure optimum hair condition and maximum client comfort at all times.
- 3 This unit standard does not include advanced setting for complex styles. Most people will however go on to seek credit for Unit 2880, *Set hair for complex styles*.

**Outcomes and evidence requirements**

**Outcome 1**

Describe how hair setting techniques and physical factors influence finished styles.

**Evidence requirements**

- 1.1 Face shape, profile, and body proportions are described in terms of their influence on hair styles.

Range        seven face shapes;

profiles – concave, convex, straight, low forehead, protruding chin; body proportions may include but are not limited to – neck, ears, height size.

1.2 Hair tendencies are described in terms of their influence on finished styles.

Range hairline, crown, nape growth, natural partings, curl movement.

1.3 Different types of roller placements are described in terms of their influence on finished styles.

Range on base, off base, half base, over-directed, under-directed, indentation.

## **Outcome 2**

Prepare to set short hair for volume.

### **Evidence requirements**

2.1 Consultation with the client identifies and confirms work needed.

2.2 The hair and scalp are analysed.

Range porosity, elasticity, texture, density, length, scalp conditions, growth patterns.

2.3 The style to be set is selected in accordance with confirmed outcome and compatibility with hair and scalp analysis.

2.4 The client is protected against water and/or product spillage.

2.5 Hair is prepared for setting in accordance with hair and scalp analysis, product instructions and confirmed outcome.

Range hydrogen bonds broken.

2.6 Styling aids are selected to meet the requirements of selected style.

## **Outcome 3**

Set and dress short hair for volume.

### **Evidence requirements**

3.1 Styling products are selected and applied to hair in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, hair analysis and confirmed outcome.

3.2 Rollers are placed in the hair using a technique that will achieve confirmed outcome.

Range rollers must be secured with pins.

- 3.3 Hair is prepared for drying in a manner which ensures maximum client protection and comfort.
- 3.4 Hair is dried in a manner which ensures that hair is dried without damage, and that client's safety and comfort is maintained.
- 3.5 Styling aids are removed from the hair ensuring maximum hair protection and client comfort.
- 3.6 Brushed hair matches requirements of preliminary shape.
- 3.7 Hair is dressed in the desired style to meet confirmed outcome.  
Range includes – use of back-combing in the dress-out.
- 3.8 The hair set, including dressing, is completed within a maximum time of one hour and ten minutes.

**Outcome 4**

Complete follow-up actions.

**Evidence requirements**

- 4.1 Home haircare advice provided is consistent with client's hair type and completed service.  
Range product type, hair maintenance.
- 4.2 Tools and equipment are sanitised in accordance with workplace requirements.
- 4.3 The work area is cleaned and tidied in accordance with workplace requirements.  
Range work area – shampoo area, styling station.
