# **Guidance Information**

- 1 This standard can be used as evidence towards qualification as an urban pest management contractor under the EPA Hazardous Substances (Hazardous Property Controls) Notice 2017 as amended by the EPA Notices (Amendments and Revocations) Notice 2020.
- 2 This standard is intended for on-job assessment under normal working conditions, but assessment for bedbug and flea infestation can be undertaken in simulated conditions.
- 3 Definitions

Integrated Pest Management is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties.

Urban Pest Management is the management of pests in built environments.

# 4 Range

Urban pest management includes – pre- and post-service procedures; Pests must include – cockroaches, flies, rodents, spiders, ants, bedbugs, fleas, silverfish;

Pests may also include but are not limited to – timber pests (termites, borers, beetles, fungal decay); insect pests of commerce, industry, accommodation, recreation, and residential premises (lice, fabric and paper pests, flies, mosquitoes, midges, stored-food pests); other arthropods (ticks, mites, centipedes, slaters, millipedes, sand-hoppers, beetles); and vertebrate pests (rats, mice, birds, possums, feral cats, rabbits, mustelids).

Undertake an integrated urban pest management service.

Range an integrated pest management service includes – chemical application, nonchemical treatment options.

## Performance criteria

- 1.1 Plant required for an integrated urban pest management service is checked and prepared.
  - Range plant may include any machinery, vehicle, vessel, aircraft, equipment (including personal protective equipment), appliance, container, implement, or tool; and any component of any of those things; and anything fitted or connected to any of those things; personal protective equipment – includes anything used or worn by a person (including clothing) to minimise risks to the person's health and safety; and may include air-supplied respiratory equipment.
- 1.2 Urban pest management service procedures are carried out.
  - Range includes but is not limited to personal, client, and environmental safety.
- 1.3 Service-related communication requirements are completed.
- 1.4 Reporting and record-keeping requirements are completed.
