Purpose	<p>People awarded this unit standard are able to, in instances of mate ohorere, identify:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - the rights and obligations of whānau and the police when engaging; - pathways available to whānau and the police when engaging; and - the rights and obligations of whānau when engaging with other official authorities.

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Guidance Information

- 1 Tapu and noa are inextricably interwoven throughout all kaupapa concerning Te Ara Nunumi - Bereavement Pathways Māori. These elements will be explored in the context of this unit standard according to local whānau, hapū, iwi variation in tikanga.
- 2 Tikanga are te ao Māori social norms exercised by whānau, hapū and iwi. The basic principles underpinning tikanga are common, but while there are some constants, the details of performance of tikanga, and their explanation, may differ. These differences may be at a rohe, iwi, hapū, whānau, or marae level.
- 3 The context of the learning should include the tikanga of the local mana whenua (if capable) but learning others' tikanga is also encouraged. This is in order to enrich and enhance understanding of tikanga, and also adapting tikanga when operating in unprecedented situations such as a global pandemic.
- 4 Definition
Mate ohorere refers to sudden death.
- 5 Legislation relevant to this unit standard includes, but is not limited to Coroners Act 2006; Hazardous Substances and New Organisms Act 1996; Health Act 1956; Human Rights Act 1993; Accident Compensation Act 2001; Policing Act 2008; Privacy Act 2020; Resource Management Act 1991; and relevant local government bylaws and legislation and key documents about New Zealand's COVID-19 response retrieved from <https://covid19.govt.nz/alert-levels-and-updates/legislation-and-key-documents/>.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Identify the rights and obligations of whānau and the police when engaging, in instances of mate ohore.

- 1.1 Rights and obligations of whānau when engaging with the police are identified.
- 1.2 Rights and obligations of police when engaging with whānau are identified.
- 1.3 Strategies to ensure the rights and obligations of whānau are supported are identified.

Outcome 2

Identify pathways available to whānau and the police when engaging, in instances of mate ohore.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 Police pathways when engaging with whānau are identified.
- 2.2 Appropriate tikanga pathways for whānau are identified when engaging with police

Outcome 3

Identify the rights and obligations of whānau when engaging with other official authorities, in instances of mate ohore.

Range may include but is not limited to – medical officer coroner, hospital staff, funeral director, paramedics, emergency services.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 Rights and obligations of whānau when engaging with other official authorities are identified.
- 3.2 Strategies to ensure the rights and obligations of whānau are supported are identified.
- 3.3 Complaints pathways are available to whānau, if required, are identified.
