Outcome 2

Demonstrate knowledge of leadership theory for the instruction of an outdoor recreation activity.

Performance criteria

- 2.1 Compare relevant leadership theories in terms of their advantages and limitations.
- 2.2 Explain contemporary issues in terms of outdoor recreation leadership in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Outcome 3

Demonstrate knowledge of pedagogical strategies for instruction of an outdoor recreation activity.

Performance criteria

- 3.1 Explain the purpose of learning outcomes for outdoor recreation activity instruction.
- 3.2 Explain the purpose of assessing participants for outdoor recreation activities.

Range pre- and post-activity.

- 3.3 Describe strategies to check learning for an outdoor recreation activity.
- 3.4 Explain the components and purpose of the evaluation of an outdoor recreation activity.
- 3.5 Explain the purpose and use of scaffolding strategies for learning within outdoor instruction.

Outcome 4

Compare facilitation techniques used in instructing outdoor recreation activities.

Performance criteria

- 4.1 Compare facilitation techniques used in instructing outdoor recreation activities with current professional good practice.
 - Range may include but not limited to front loading, experiential learning, instructor centred, learner centred, reflection, peer/group discussions.

Outcome 5

Demonstrate knowledge of constructive feedback techniques for outdoor recreation activities.

Performance criteria

- 5.1 Explain the purpose of providing feedback for outdoor recreation activities.
- 5.2 Analyse a range of constructive feedback techniques and explain how each technique might be applied effectively for instructing an outdoor recreation activity.
