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## Guidance Information

It is expected, but not required, that this unit standard will be assessed at or near the completion of a programme leading to the achievement of all outcomes of the New Zealand Certificate in Carpentry (Level 4) [Ref: 2738].

Assessment for this unit standard is a holistic judgement of the candidate's ability to maintain the professional standards of the carpentry trade by consistently demonstrating the skills, knowledge and attributes that reflect the technical competence, self-management, professionalism and leadership required of a carpentry trade professional.

The level of performance for this standard is consistency with current professional standards. Professional standards are reflected in:

- employment agreements, codes of conduct and standard operating procedures; training and education agreements; standards of ethics and professionalism produced by industry membership organisations; best practice and technical guidance produced by suppliers, regulators, education and industry organisations.

Assessment for this standard may be partially based on evidence that was accumulated as the candidate gained the knowledge, skills and experience of the trade, and must occur in the context of the workplace.

Competence in this standard must be corroborated with, and confirmed by, a person who has current expertise in the carpentry trade and has had the opportunity to regularly observe the candidate in the workplace.

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## Skill specification and performance level guidance

### Skill specification

Maintain the professional standards of the carpentry industry as a carpentry trade professional.

**Know** The practical and conceptual interrelationships between the standards required to achieve the New Zealand Certificate in Carpentry (Level 4) [Ref: 2738].

How to locate and interpret carpentry industry professional standards.

The connection between professional standards and the sustainability of the carpentry trade.

**Do** Perform all aspects of the carpentry trade to a commercially competent standard.

Demonstrate professional behaviour on a day-to-day basis.

Fulfil responsibilities in the workplace under commercial contracts, employment and education agreements.

Self-manage on-going learning and development to maintain currency with carpentry industry professional standards.

Support the learning and development of others attaining the trade.

Lead and coordinate the everyday onsite operations of commercial construction projects.

### Performance level guidance

A commercially competent standard means completing work to a commercial standard in a commercial environment without supervision.

Demonstrating professional behaviour on a day-to-day basis is likely to include working constructively with clients, suppliers and people involved in the candidate's learning programme, being consistently reliable, responsible and accountable, acting with integrity, making and keeping commitments, and showing respect and consideration for people, property and the environment.

Leading and coordinating the everyday onsite operations of commercial construction projects includes coordinating the work of other trades, workflow management and completing work within the scope provided without requiring regular guidance and/or scrutiny.
