# Outcomes and performance criteria

## Outcome 1

Demonstrate personal advanced tramping skills.

#### **Performance criteria**

1.1	Demonstrate	overnight camp craft skills above the bush line.
	Range	campsite selection, gear management, cooking in adverse conditions, toileting practices, and identifying any natural hazards.
1.2	Demonstrate	a range of river and creek crossing techniques.
	Range	solo, group, retreat; minimum five different techniques.

1.3 Demonstrate a recovery swim, and use of throw bag for a given river crossing.

#### Outcome 2

Demonstrate advanced navigation above and below the bush line in moderate to hard offtrack terrain.

#### Performance criteria

- 2.1 Apply track navigation skills in varied and steep terrain above the bush line using a map and natural features.
- 2.2 Demonstrate advanced navigation techniques in off-track terrain.
  - Range catching features, aiming off, attack points, handrails, navigating around an object both with and without a compass, and using a resection to locate position on a map.
- 2.3 Use compass magnetic and grid bearings to navigate in thick bush and/or limited visibility above the bush line.
- 2.4 Navigate off track using location awareness using only natural features, observation and memory.

# Outcome 3

Demonstrate and apply knowledge of meteorology, weather interpretation and forecasting.

## Performance criteria

3.1 Describe global weather systems and outline global weather influences on New Zealand's weather systems.

3.2 Apply weather interpretation skills to plan and manage tramping trips above bush line and adapt trip in relation to weather as required.
