- 3 *Demonstrate detailed skills to develop project specifications and produce contemporary wearable with tāniko* will be evidenced through:
- detailed explanations of project specification designs including size, identification of patterns, colours, features and representation of wearable;
 - tāniko tension is consistent;
 - tāniko pattern is even and balanced;
 - produced wearable is of a refined manner;
 - evaluations are detailed from commencement to completion.
- 4 *Demonstrate comprehensive skills to develop project specifications and produce contemporary wearable with tāniko* will be evidenced through:
- comprehensive explanations of project specification designs show development of ideas and concepts;
 - tāniko tension is of an exceptional standard, having no gaps and no distortion;
 - colour placement within tāniko pattern/s enhance the overall design;
 - produced wearable is of an exceptional standard;
 - evaluations are comprehensive from commencement to completion.
- 5 Ākongā will keep a fully documented visual diary or workbook.
- 6 Definitions
Ngā Mahi ā te Whare Pora refers to a house or place that is set aside to teach and conserve the art of weaving.
 Contemporary refers to post 1945.
 Customary refers to pre 1945.
Sketched may refer to drafts, plans, drawings, digitally generated material.
Tikanga and kawa refers to the practices or protocols used in Māori society, which are applied in particular situations. These practices or protocols reflect the concepts upon which they are based. Tikanga and kawa also provide guidelines for appropriate behaviour in Māori society and prescribes consequences for any breaches or when tikanga and kawa is not followed.
Wearable refers to any wearable garment but is not limited to – korowai, kākahu, pari, piupiu, tāpeka, maro, pake/pākē, tātua, hieke.
- 7 Referencing:
 All sources of information must be referenced.

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Develop project specifications for the production of contemporary wearable with tāniko.

Range evidence of one wearable for either an adult male or an adult female.

Performance criteria

1.1 Project specification designs for the wearable are sketched and developed.

Range may include but is not limited to – size, patterns, colours, features, representations.

1.2 Project specifications for the gathering and preparation of the materials to complete the wearables are developed.

Range may include but is not limited to – harakeke, whītau, decorative elements, dyes.

1.3 Project specifications for the preparation of the tools and equipment are developed.

Range may include but is not limited to – haehae, scissors, soap, string, measuring boards, draught paper, pencils, equipment for dyeing.

Outcome 2

Produce contemporary wearable with tāniko and evaluate.

Range evidence of one wearable for either an adult male or an adult female.

Performance criteria

2.1 Contemporary wearable is woven using customary techniques and in accordance with the project specifications.

Range evidence must include at least 10 rows of tāniko within wearable.

2.2 Contemporary wearable is evaluated.
