Grade 3 rapids Characteristics

- have fairly high waves of 1 to 2 metres,
- broken water, stoppers and strong eddies, exposed rocks and small falls,
- a passage that may be difficult to recognise from the river, and
- require manoeuvring to negotiate the rapids.

Current industry good practice means the range of actions currently accepted within the adventure and outdoor sector (which includes the raft and riverboard industries) to manage the risk of harm to staff, participants, and visitors.

Multi raft trip means a raft trip consisting of two or more commercial rafts

Serious incident refers to a serious on-river injury or incident

Outcome 1

Performance criteria

1.1 Analyse organisational policies and procedures for the management of a serious on-river injury or incident on Grade 3 rivers in terms of industry good practice.

may include but is not limited to – communication, roles and responsibilities, on-river search, first aid considerations, evacuation from river; rescue authorities, fatality management, debrief considerations, reporting.

Outcome 2

Apply serious incident management skills as a senior raft guide leading a multi raft trip on Grade 3 rivers.

Performance criteria

2.1 Role model skills for serious incident management expected of a senior raft guide leading a multi raft trip on Grade 3 rivers.

Range technical guiding skills, effective manoeuvring of raft for rescue, personal swimming and throwing.

2.2 Manage a tethered raft rescue as a senior raft guide on a Grade 3 river.

> attachment points, dynamic movement in raft. Range

2.3 Manage a river rescue scenario as a senior raft guide on a Grade 3 river.

> Range may include but is not limited to – stabilisation lines, cinches, tethered rescuer.

Apply leadership skills during a raft emergency river rescue as a senior raft

2.4 guide leading a multi raft trip on Grade 3 rivers.

> Range leadership skills must include but are not limited to – prioritising

risk, clear communication, safety and management of participants and guides, delegation of roles, responsibilities and tasks, maintaining an overview of the situation, being flexible when faced with sudden environmental change, ensuring the situation does

not escalate, achieving a resolution.
