2 Definitions

Makaton is a communication programme, especially designed to help children and adults with communication and learning difficulties.

New Zealand Riding for the Disabled (NZRDA) is the parent body of riding for the disabled. All riding for disabled affiliated groups are referred to as Riding for the Disabled (RDA).

NZRDA standards refer to policies and procedures set by the NZRDA which are available on the Group Resource Library, NZRDA The Stable https://thestable.rda.org.nz/s/. NZRDA standards reflect current legislation. NZSL refers to the New Zealand Sign Language which is the language of New Zealand's Deaf community and an official language of New Zealand.

- 3 For the purposes of assessment:

Outcomes and performance criteria

Outcome 1

Describe communication techniques which can be applied to riders with a disability in a Riding for the Disabled (RDA) session.

Performance criteria

1.1 Describe modes of communication in terms of their use when interacting with people with a disability.

Range modes of communication may include but are not limited to –

behaviour, verbal, non-verbal, use of body language and

positioning, written, assistive technology; evidence of four modes of communication;

evidence of disability must include – cognitive, functional, sensory.

1.2 Describe factors that aid in effective communication between coach and rider.

Range factors may include but are not limited to – active listening,

acceptance, clarity of speech – pitch, tone, and volume; empathy,

respect, adaption;

evidence of four factors is required.

1.3 Describe factors that create communication barriers between coach and rider.

Range factors may include but are not limited to – cognition, expressive

language, hearing, non-verbal language, receptive language, social communication, vision, voice, impact of environment;

evidence of four factors is required.

Outcome 2

Apply a range of communication techniques for riders in a RDA session.

Performance criteria

2.1 Apply a range of communication techniques to meet individual rider communication requirements when carrying out a Riding for the Disabled session.

Range techniques may include but are not limited to – visual aids; sign

language – NZSL, Makaton; adapting language, non-verbal language, active listening, assistive technology, waiting for

responses;

evidence of three techniques is required.
